Well, we hope you like the final copy and enjoy the contents!






Other areas where parents have helped include E.S.L. classes, Resource Centre, Photocopying, The Rock n Roll Eisteddfod and as members of the School Council.





FRIENDS OF SALISBURY HIGH SCHOOL


During 1993 The Friends Group has met on a regular basis for a coffee and chat, and have had some very interesting (informal) discussions.


Our main project has been making various craft items, to sell at the Salisbury Community Fair and the time and effort put in by these very talented group of people is much appreciated.


We opened the Cafeteria in Term 3. There was a big party with plenty of cake and coke available. SA FM was there with the Black Thunder.








NORTHERN ZONE ATHLETICS CARNIVAL

When coming down you have to lean back on the rope with your legs straight and only your feet touching the rocks.


That was not easy to get used too. You felt like you were going to fall right back as there is nothing under you, but when you reach the bottom you breathe a sigh of relief.


After everyone had had a turn we walked back up to the top of the cliff.

ROCK N ROLL EISTEDDFOD

1993 WAS THE YEAR FOR SALISBURY HIGH SCHOOL

This year for the first time we submitted an entry in the Rock n Roll Eisteddfod which was a cooperative venture with Paralowie High, and WON.

Actually we came equal first with Charles Campbell Secondary College. This was the first time in the history of the event that two schools had tied for equal first, and was almost unheard of. Each school was given a mark out of a possible 210 points with seven judges giving their own score out of thirty points.

As it was the Year of the Indigenous People it seemed apt that our piece was based on an Aboriginal theme. After looking at a number of Aboriginal issues we decided on the one of taking the children away. The storyline began with a traditional outback scene with emus, kangaroos and lizards with a group of Aboriginal people sitting around a camp fire telling stories. The opening scene was beautiful with the sunset in the background. Some of the students were not initially too keen to jump around the stage like kangaroos but you can see from the video that the effect was stunning.

After a time, the beaurocrats and Policeman entered where the people were gathered and took the children away from their parents. Understandably the parents were very upset but were powerless to do anything. These children were put in institutions. Whiteman wanted to assimilate them into their society, however the Aboriginal children knew that they didn't quite fit, as much as they tried to join in. In this case the story had a happy ending as the children were eventually reunited with their parents.

One of the criteria for judging was the emotional responses the piece had on the audience. While I knew the story would be touching, I had no idea it was so powerful. The number of people who actually cried while watching the performance was overwhelming. This was also contributed to James Collard's voice over at the completion of the performance that said "The cries and screams of the children still haunt us. Their voices echo through our hearts and minds".

Rowanna Grundy played the lead role of the little girl with Willy Tikoilomadra dancing beautifully as the little boy. Sue Nettle did a brilliant job playing the mother as did John Clarke, who played the father.


At last the hours of endless rehearsals paid off and the whole Salisbury Community felt proud of the schools achievements.






prepared a welcoming lunch for new teachers





Going from primary school to high school is a big step for most people, a lot of parents ignore the fact that not all of the other students are as friendly as they could be. Becky and I had a small group of about six girls – all from Salisbury North Primary School. Another girl joined also joined us – a peer support leader named Leanne Luppino. Our group of girls were very nice. They were quiet and slightly apprehensive but they talked freely with us and communicated well. Next we led them around and gave them explanations of where and how things are at Salisbury High School. They listened carefully and took all of our information.

They asked questions and told us about things happening at their primary school. We led them to their classrooms, outside areas etc. We described different teaching subjects to them and what the rules were in the school community.

After the Year 7 girls had had a good walk around the whole school we went to the Home Economics Centre. Lunch for them had been prepared. It was bread rolls that had been halved and covered with pizza topping. As the girls did not seem to want both pieces of pizza they freely gave away one half.

By this time the girls and us three support leaders were very comfortable with each other and chatting to one another about everything.

In conclusion everyone in our particular group had a very rewarding day. Although at the beginning of the day most of the girls had been slightly shy but in the afternoon they were all very happy and open towards us. For us, Leanne too, it was a unique experience. We all made friends with the Year 7's and now that they go to Salisbury High we can greet them in the corridors whenever we see them. I think that the Transition Day was a big help to them and a great idea and that it should be continued in the future. Also because the kids were introducted to high school life through fellow students it eased the transition somewhat. I found it to be a very unique and reward experience and I'm sure others in the Peer Suport programme feel the same way.

AUSTRALIAN SCHOOLS SCIENCE COMPETITION

Salisbury High School entered 19 students in the Australian Schools Science Competition this year. Students from the school gained 3 certificates which included 1 Distinction and 2 Certificates of Achievement.

Students who perform well receive certificates, suitable for framing. The certificates are awarded in school years seven to twelve as follows:

High Distinction – top 1% in the state
Distinction – next 10% in the state
Credit – next 20% in the state

Students in the top 20% of their school who have not qualified for one of the above certificates receive a Certificate of Achievement.


The student who was awarded a Distinction Certificate was Annmarie Munro, Year 10. Congratulations Annmarie!

Simon Graham, Year 9, and Leanne Salvemini, Year 8, were also awarded Certificates of Achievement.

A total of 283,000 students in Australia, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea, Singapore, Fiji and Vanuatu participated in the competition. The competition is written, produced and organised each year by the Educational Testing Centre of the University of New South Wales. The Australian Schools Science Competition is proudly sponsored by Esso Australia Ltd.

The aim of the competition is to provide students with a stimulating challenge and comprehensive feedback on their performance. All students receive an individual letter telling them which questions they got right as well as the average mark for their school and state. The letter is a useful aid in pointing out strengths and weaknesses in the various skills and processes tested in the competition.

The best boy and girl in each school year in the state will receive a medal which will be sent to the school in approximately four to six weeks. Equal top students will receive individual medals.




Both girls increased their knowledge of the career, while having a good time.

SALISBURY YOUTH ANNEXE

Consolidating the successes of the "Salisbury At Risk" Youth Centre during 1992, the Salisbury/Paralowie Cooperative opened a Salisbury Youth Annexe for 1993 and beyond. Based at the Salisbury North Community Centre (Hissar Avenue), the Annexe provides places for twenty high school "at risk" students (ten from Salisbury and ten from Paralowie). The students have been undertaking 5 SACE units of study: Maths, English, Australian Studies (Youth Enterprise Publishing), Community Studies (Lifestyle) and Community Studies (Life skills).

Teaching staff at the Annexe includes Glenys Oakey (Coordinator), Neville Campbell (Paralowie R-12), Joe Parker (Exchange teacher from Amercia) and Jim Oakey (Salisbury High School). The twenty combined campus students have been working on a sequel to the 1992 Award winning video "No Space of Their Own". This years production concentrates on lifestyle, crime and crime prevention in the Salisbury/Elizabeth area – with links drawn between lifestyle, crime and brain injury.

We are also reprinting an updated and improved 1994 edition of the highly acclaimed Salisbury Youth Information Directory (YEP booklet). This is a SACE Accredited Community Studies course. Great emphasis is placed upon Work Education linked to Independent Living Skills.


The Annexe has also forged links with Elizabeth TAFE (now Para Institute) by offering a Pre-Vocational course in Youth work, bringing an extra fifteen TAFE students into the Annexe to work side by side with the combined campus students.


Successes throughout 1993 have been


- Five students have obtained full time employment (one at GMH and four in small local business providing Apprenticeships)

- One student has secured a place at TAFE for 1994
- Six students are being trained as Radio Technicians at the local Community Radio station.
- One student has trained as a child care giver and is now a qualified child care worker
- Six pre-vocational students have opted to return to full time schooling in the Salisbury/Paralowie Cooperative for 1994.
- The Student Behaviour Modification
 - Programme included an eight day excursion for thirteen Annexe students to Canberra and Sydney. Three staff members from the Annexe supervised the trip. The group met with the local Federal Member of Parliament, Neal Blewett and had a guided tour of the whole of Parliament House.
- Ten students attended a weekend camp "Paint shooting" as part of the Behaviour Management Programme developing leadership and communication skills.
- The Annexe students have designed and built a range of "Cubby Houses" for sale as part of the SACE Community Studies course one of the cubby houses has been donated to the Salisbury North Community Centre kindergarten as a gesture of goodwill from Salisbury Youth at Risk to the Community.
- . The Annexe students are constructing a trailer from kit form, developing skills in metal trades.

We hope to continue building upon these successes during 1994 and beyond.





This year Technology Studies has for many students opened the door of opportunity. Students have had the opportunity to study in a variety of Technology areas; some being the traditional subjects Woodwork, Metalwork and Plastics while other more modern subjects such as Computer Aided Drawing are being introduced and have gained considerable popularity. CAD as we know this subject is currently the most up to the minute program offered to any student in South Australian schools. Enabling Salisbury High School students to be at the front in this area we must give due recognition to the Schools CAD teacher, Grant Evans, who has not only developed Salisbury's programme but has been provided time by The School of the Future to make this program available to all schools in South Australia.

This year we were able to bring to completion the purchase of a class set of IBM 486 DX computers, the work being commenced in 1992 by Tony Curtis and Phil Fetchik. This hard work and planning has made it possible for Technology Studies to provide a course in Keyboarding for all year 8 students in 1994 as part of their Technology course work.

We believe that our students will benefit and be able to produce much of their formal written work via this skill.

Our developments within Technology Studies have been

- a. the acquisition of a Hercus Horizontal Mill
- the acquisition of a 305mm Douglas Shaper
- c. the purchase of two more Model A Hercus Lathes
- d. the purchase of a 235 AMP MAG welder


These machines together with existing equipment enable us to provide a wealth of metal working skills to our students.




PEER SUPPORT - STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES

CAREERS FOR WOMEN IN ENGINEERING




Afterwards the girls enjoyed the engineering displays set up by the major national and international companies.





LANGUAGES OTHER THAN ENGLISH

The LOTE students have generally been a committed group of students in Years 9 to 12 as they have chosen language study as an area of interest to them. In Year 8 where all students have had to do either German or Italian a more general exposure to cultural and language has occured with many puzzles, word searches, competitions, posters, magazines and videos. Most students have responded well and enjoyed their year of study. Unfortunately our computer games and exercises have not been available as their network has become defunct and the software is not compatible with the new system which the school has purchased. Attempts have been made to gain a special grant for new software which is suitable and at least as good as our old computer programmes. Investigations are still going on.

German and Italian food days have been held and a number of students entered the National Languages competition to celebrate Languages month in August. They had to design a fifty word super crossword in their LOTE and provide appropriate clues. Also several LOTE students entered the National Language Certificates competition in July. This consisted of multi choice, responses to a series of short articles or adverts from German/Italian newspapers and magazines or from audio tape on topical themes. The students found the questions tricky, challenging and even fun trying to spot the trick in the choices. There are prizes to be won and a prestigious certificate to be presented to all who took part. We are still waiting for the result of these competitions and hope our students are successful.

Corey Enthoven (Year 12 German) had a fantastic Christmas and start tot he year, having spent seven weeks as an exchange student in Dartmund in Germany. A number of our students have done the same in recent years. As part of the exchange, Corey's family hosted a student from Germany for eight weeks in July and August. He is called Henning Muller and is fifteen years old. As well as touring Australia extensively, he spent time experiencing Australian school life, attending lessons with Corey and his brother Adam. He visited all German classes and talked to them and answered questions about life as a teenager in Germany. I am continually encouraging the German students in Years 8 and 9 to institute a savings plan with their parents to be able to take part in one of these exchanges which would be the experience of a life time – snow, skiing, Christmas in Germany or Italy, as exchanges are available also for Italian students to that country.

All German students sit for oral conversation tests regularly and gain certificates of performance for this. Most do very well with many 'A's' and they are encouraged to keep these certificates in folios or folders as they will be valuable in the future. Many areas of work are coming to value more employees who have some knowledge of one of our community languages.

The Italian students had a very interesting excursion in Term III. The German students planned to go to see 'Sister Act' in German but the theatre booked out before enough students paid. We did not hold our annual excursion to Hahndorf and the other German settlements in the Adelaide Hills this year, but hopefully, we can reinstate this again next year.

It was good to welcome back Mrs Maria Denison as out Italian teacher this year and for the students to have the one teacher right through the year, brining back the stability needed in this area.

Congratulations to the students who won the prizes for being the best LOTE student at each year level and to those who gained certificates of merit for their year's work. Well done.

WOMEN'S MULTICULTURAL ARTS PROJECT

This year a number of our parents participated in the Women's Multicultural Arts project. This project was a parent participation initiative aimed at increasing participation of parents from non-English speaking backgrounds and Aboriginal parents. The project was coordinated by Melindy Bellotti as part of the Supportive School Environment project, Melindy worked in close collaboration with Community Liaison Officers in the Salisbury North West Cluster – Dorothy Westell (Salisbury High School), Bronwyn Honey (Burton R-7), Mary Jo Bellew (Paralowie R-12), Di Slater (Salisbury North 3-7). During this project over thirty women from Vietnamese, Cambodian, Spanish Speaking and Aboriginal backgrounds from the four schools attended workshops on a weekly basis.

Parents worked with three artists Elaine Gardner, Yvonne Nowland and Lynne Elzinga-Henry. They worked alongside participants encouraging the women to discuss and share their traditional use of design and colour whilst developing new skills associated with silk screen printing, applique and silk painting.

Cultural information gained from the women has been incorporated into designs for four textile panels reflecting the cultural backgrounds of the women involved in the project. These panels tell the story of the women's migration experiences, settlement in Australia and their hopes for the future. They will be hung as a set and rotated around the four schools participating in this project. They will also be displayed at the City of Salisbury Council Chambers and will be exhibited in country South Australia during 1994. It is hoped that these panels will be used as a teaching resource for subjects across the curriculum.

Special thanks must go to all the parents who participated in this project and to Salisbury High's very own Community Liaison Officer Dorothy Westell for her energy, enthusiasm and tireless support for this project.








YEAR 9 REPORT


We climbed the sand dunes and swam the river, after lunch, someone even found a dead snake.





We have been to rodeos, journeyed through the jungle on a Commando course, para sailed, had joy flights at Parafield Airport plus a myriad of other things.


