

uring the past 12 months, we have seen Salisbury High chool go from strength to strength, and at events like peech Day it is important that we take the opportunity preflect on our success and the challenges that lie head, especially for our Year 12 students as they start heir journey through adulthood and into the next phase of their lives.

his year has seen our school continue to flourish as we implement new initiatives in particular the IBMYP and loys Education strategies which has reinforced our role is an innovative centre of learning and an important part I Salisbury's community fabric.

For the 3rd year in a row, Salisbury High School has been selected as one of the 10 best schools in Australia in "The Australian Best Schools Awards". And each year we have won a different category – this year it was for an area of excellence in special education. This award is one of many that we have earned during 2003, and reflects how this school works as a team.

We were also the only high school in the State to win an award in the National Awards for Quality Schooling for School Leadership and received an \$8,000 grant.. Salisbury High School has won literacy and numeracy awards and has been successful in obtaining many grants.

We have also applied for the Australian Business Excellence Awards, for I believe that we also have to operate effectively and efficiently at a management level if our school is to be the best.

These accolades are wonderful rewards - not just for the students and teachers - but also for our many loyal sponsors and the community of Salisbury, of which this school is an integral part. There were, of course, many other highlights including one of our teachers Rebecca Stapleton being awarded a national excellence in teaching award.

At Salisbury we make special efforts to ensure that our students undertake the subjects for which they are best equipped to handle, thus allowing us to maximise their many talents and to perform at their best in examinations and other assessments. During 2003, we also saw Salisbury High School continue to maintain and expand its links with the Salisbury community, especially with commerce and industry.

This year we joined with UniSA and e-Labtronics to win a national robotics mentoring award in a field of endeavour that demonstrates the way in which our students - when given the opportunities - can be absolute world beaters.

At times when we have been unable to implement much needed courses for students by using traditional education resources, our relationship with the private sector has assisted us to do what many other schools may have found extremely difficult to implement. A prime example was the way in which we employed Training Prospects to deliver certificates One to Four in Horticulture and Electronics, a step that illustrated how our partnership with industry pays handsome dividends in achieving what others may see as impossible.



We have continued to play a pivotal role in the extremely important Youth Opportunities program, which we helped pioneer, and we are delighted that Channel 7 and 5AA put on the first fundraising Auction Banquet earlier this year raising \$60,000 to ensure this extremely valuable program will continue for the benefit of other students in other schools.

This year, we hosted our third Aboriginal Reconciliation Ball, and were fortunate to again have as our guest of honor, the Federal Minister for Science, Education and Training, Dr Brendan Nelson.

Significantly, we have also retained our leadership as the high school with the highest university intake in the area.....the fourth consecutive year we have achieved this. Importantly, we also saw a continued increase in the retention of students choosing to complete SACE.

Last year I mentioned the importance of developing our five core values, through consultation with staff, students and parents. These values are Relationships; Respect; Honesty; Success; and Organisation.

I have been immensely proud of the way in which our response to the Salisbury Rail Crossing has instilled in our student population the importance of life, the need to care for one another, and made us aware of the importance of facing adversity and problems - and tackling them head on rather than treating them as insurmountable obstacles and detouring around them.

As many of you know, I have suffered my own health problems this year, but through these I have found great strength in the love and support of friends, family, staff and students and the broader community.


I thank all of you for your well wishes, and I look forward to returning to school next year.

Salisbury High School will continue in the direction it has set and will further develop and enhance its local, national and global reputation as an enterprising school that is making a difference for its school community.


I'd like to thank the Year 10 Multimedia group led by Jim Oakey and Ryan Westell for their planning and hard work, the final result of which is this year's year book.





2003 has once again been a huge year for Sallsbury High School.






Reconciliation Youth Ambassadors' Ball




Finally, we were honoured to have had Stephen Page, the Director of the Adelaide Festival 2004, as our MC and thank him for his support and superb job on the evening.

Popular Adelaide poet, Geoff Goodfellow, made two visits to Sallsbury High senior students this year at the invitation of English teacher, Barbara James. After giving his audience some background on how he became a poet, some career highlights and recent successes, he punched out his first poem, Crowd Control, about the bouncer, Terry, who loved the power of his position too much. Eighteen more poems followed covering a wide range of issues such as the significance of where you live, the effects of war on families, domestic violence, glue sniffing, multiculturalism, and love

Geoff Goodfellow didn't just 'read' his work. He brought to life the characters in his poems by recreating their voices. Students still remember the Iraqi refugee woman in Clever Woman and the old lady from Semaphore who is excited at the prospect of going to Victor Harbor with her daughter. Many students expressed delight and surprise that a poet who is somewhat older than they could portray the teenage years so accurately in Don't Look So Glum. With his hard-hitting, confrontational style of delivery, Goodfellow both entertained and engaged the students and got them thinking about how they, too, can express their thoughts and feelings through poetry.


ROBOTICS

One of the many innovative approaches Science has undertaken this year has been a Peer Mentoring Program in a Year 9 and a Year 10 classes. Students from the University of South Australia have acted as mentors to our students to deliver a Robotics/Electronics course.

Every Friday for 10 weeks, 3 peer mentors work with each class to build and program a robot. The students started learning to solder by making a little electronic game and then, in pairs, have gone on to build the robot. One student soldered the circuit board, while their partner built the robot buggy. Once completed, the buggy can then be programmed from the computer to do a range of things, including changing movement according to a change in light intensity.

Students have enjoyed this opportunity to learn in a different environment and most of them look forward to their Robotics session each Friday. As teachers, Mrs Trenwith and I have also learnt a lot along the way and we look forward to continuing with Robotics with more classes next year.


In Science we concentrated on students learning the practical aspects of dealing with evidence. Students completed a number of activities, including Fingerprinting, Hair and Fibre analysis, Tyre Tracking and Blood Splattering. Throughout the unit, students were able to get their Forensic Qualifications in each area.

The whole unit culminated in a fake crime scene set up in one of the shade houses. The students needed to gather and analyse evidence to eliminate suspects and find the ultimate culprit. All Year 8 students could tell you that it was our poor Special Ed Coordinator, Emma Medhurst who (supposedly) got poisoned by one of our Maths/Science Teachers, Adrienne Gregory!!

Some of our students were interviewed by the media, and an article was written about the unit in 'The Advertiser'.

All students enjoyed the opportunity for this 'hands on' activity and, as Science Teachers, we hope that it may have provoked some students to aim for a career in this field.





Paralowie House

The past year as the Paralowie House Alternative Education Coordinator has been immensely rewarding and challenging and has given me invaluable curriculum development, administration and management experience.

Paralowie House has always been unique in its curriculum delivery and the services that it provides to young people and community members in the northern region. This year is no different. Academically, a number of students received Satisfactory Achievement or Recorded Achievement for their Stage 1 and Stage 2 SACE units and several students have gained employment or gone on to further education in their chosen field.

This year has been one of immense change in the area of service delivery with Port Adelaide Central Mission joining us at Paralowie House to both upgrade the facilities and further improve the range of services that are available to the young people of the area. Michelle Papillo from the PACM has been untiring in her work to improve the facilities (as can be seen by the photos of the upgrades) and attract other service deliverers to the house. Some of the other agencies that have joined us or that are joining us are:-

- Port Adelaide Central Mission Social Worker, Paul Cameron.
- Various Work For the Dole programs including most of the ground's upgrades

- Adelaide Central Mission Reconnect Second Storey Young Mum's Group Adelaide Central Mission Literacy and Numeracy. program

We have undertaken a number projects and continued maintaining the old ones; in particular, a three day Active 8 Leadership camp down at Hindmarsh Island where the students gained valuable skills and fiad a lot of enjoyment, thanks to Robyn Haddow and Wendy

er activities included an exciting promotional activity called the Rap It Up Multi Media Project, which was organised by Lifeline to help raise awareness of young people's mental health issues production of a Music Video which was entered into the Rap It Up competition.

The students received a special award for their original

song "Porcelain Doll" which is a beautiful song written in dedication of Katanya, the baby daughter of two of the students, who died at 5 months of age.

The students have also continued working on Paralowie House projects, eg building the propagation shed, maintaining the house gardens, olive grove and vineyard.

This year we also included the opportunity for students to gain access to Tertiary level courses and we were able to offer certificate courses in Horticulture, Aged Care, Hospitality and Information Technology. We hope to be able to continue with Certificate courses next year and broaden the range on offer.

Wendy Johnston, has continued to work with the students as a Youth Worker/ Student Support Officer and has been of tremendous help. I doubt that we could have survived the year as well as we have without her unwavering support and energetic involvement. Wendy has initiated and runs an Intensive Learning Assistance program that has attracted some volunteer parents and that is helping a lot of the students with learning difficulties get better outcomes. She has also taken on some teacher assistant tasks and has become an integral part of the staff here. I sincerely hope that her involvement will continue.

Robyn Haddow has put in a tireless effort with the students and their involvement with both Active 8 and the Rap It Up Video Clip Competition. She has helped them gain invaluable experience in film making, editing and recording and we have discovered that many of our students have hidden talents in music and dramatic areas. She has also brought out leadership qualities in many of our students with their involvement in the Active 8 Community Challenge. One group is currently renovating a shed into a recreation area for other students and another group is building a library to improve access to books and information for young ople that attend the program


On our last night after the teachers went to sleep we ordered 17 pizzas and 3 Cokes...showing good team work and cooperation.

Youth Opportunities has helped me to be more motivated and willing to do more things in life.





used to say.



CAREER PLANNING

Career Guidance is a service to assist students in making appropriate and realistic career choices. Student Employment Services provides guidance to students giving them information to help them decide on what course of study, where they can upgrading their existing skills, or finding the right job.

This year has been an exciting one for Year 8 subject teachers. who trialled two interdisciplinary units. The first, "What have we learned from the Ancient World" commenced in Term One. Students explored the extent to which Modern Society has been influenced by the Ancient World in Society & Environment, English, Home Economics, Mathematics and Science. All year 8 students were surveyed after the completion of this unit, and their responses indicated that an overwhelming number felt that cross-curriculum units helped them learn better. Year 8 students indicated that the most enjoyable part of this unit was learning about Ancient Societies in S&E, English and Mathematics.

During term 3, students were faced with a most puzzling scenario. Someone had attempted to poison Ms Medhurst, and the students were to work in Forensic Teams to solve the crime as a part of the unit "How reliable is evidence?" Students explored this theme in S&E. English, Mathematics and Science. Throughout the term, students maintained a Detective Diary, recording relevant information. In the penultimate week of the term, students had the opportunity to inspect the crime scene, interview suspects, and collect evidence. They were then required to analyse the data, identify the perpetrator of the crime and write a Police Report.

"I have had a very enjoyable time in Maths, English, BSE and Science learning about evidence. We have learnt about fingerprinting, shoe prints, tyre tracks, soil acidity and blood splashes. We also did logic and deduction, our own mystery showbag, identikits, the Ice Man and murder mysteries."




