

Dear Parents and Caregivers

It is with mixed feelings that I announce that I have accepted a Principal's position at St John's College, a Greek Orthodox R–12 school in Melbourne, from the beginning of 2008.

As many of you may be aware, I recently married Prof. Geoff Masters, CEO of the Australian Council for Educational Research, which has its head office in Melbourne. This has meant that one of us eventually would move, and, after much thought, I have decided to move out of my comfort zone - after 24 years at Salisbury High School! Geoff and I were quite happy to live in different cities until a job came along that really excited me: a job that felt like the right next step for me. But I did not expect to find that job so soon!

St John's College will present new challenges as well as appealing to my Greek side. It will provide an opportunity to use the experience, knowledge and skills I have gained at Salisbury High School to build and lead the school into the future. As Warren Bennis has written, 'The point is not to become a leader, but to become yourself, to use yourself completely—all of your skills'. I believe St John's Greek Orthodox College will give me that opportunity.

While I have been Principal for the past 9 years, I came to Salisbury High School as a teacher in 1983 and never left, apart from a short secondment in the Education Department. I did not have any burning ambition to be a Principal, but found myself loving my job and wanting to make a difference. Through a range of leadership jobs at Salisbury High School, I was determined to lead our school community to provide the best educational outcomes and services for our students.

I have learnt that leadership is about influencing others and building leadership capacity in a supportive learning culture, with a view to improving learning. I owe much to my executive team (past and present) who passionately joined me in developing a positive school ethos with agreed community goals, values and purpose. Our motto: "Pathways to Success" and clear aim continues to keep us focused on ensuring that each of our students is supported to have a successful future. I want to thank the staff (past and present) for working extensively and collaboratively with the school community, building positive relationships with students and families, and for developing new initiatives and innovative programs to best meet the needs of our school community.

I am proud to say that over the past 24 years I have worked with the most dedicated and committed people – staff, parents and students – who have made my job very enjoyable and worthwhile. It has been a pleasure working with the broader community and I am proud to say that today, Salisbury High School is a high demand school with over 70 on the year 8 waiting list.



The excursion was planned to give students a chance to sample some of the opportunities and facilities at Adelaide University. Care Group teachers took their Care students across to the centre after Friday's assembly. Students rotated through a number of activities including water



hat a great year at has been for the Year 12/13 class of 2007. All stall agree that this is an excellent group of Students who have set a high benchmark for future years. They have studied hard with good results and been actively involved in school sport and other extra curricular activities.

Of course many things have happened throughout the school year but some interesting events throughout this year have been: the establishment of a formal committee, where students can have input into the organization of the formal and also get credit toward their SACE, regular peer lutoring sessions in pastoral care, our Principal Helen Symeonakis meeting with small groups of year 12's over lunch to discuss ways we can help them be successful, several students receiving their Global Citizen Medal, Guest Speakers from Universities and Industry. We have had a big increase in the number of students who have attended the Adelaide Tuition Centre Holiday seminars to help increase their exam results. We have also had students organize private tuition as they prepare for exams.

The senior school offers three pathways designed to better cater for student needs. Currently 43% of our year 12/13 students are doing Vocational Pathways, 32% are doing Community or a General Pathway and 24% are doing a University pathway. I am pleased to say that all students across all three pathways have worked hard throughout the year and we are expecting that over 90% of our students are going to achieve their SACE and therefore reach their goals.

YEAR 12/13 CONFERENCE DAY



This year has been a very successful year in sport at Salisbury high and we are very proud of the students achievements. A big thankyou must go to all staff that have helped with sport this year.



immensely was their excursion to Glenelg. We went on a heart stopping power jet boat ride provided by Helavajet boat.





COMMUNITY AND SERVICE SHOWCASE

Throughout the year members of our school community; students, teachers and SSO's, are involved in many Community and Service activities, working towards the well-being of others. ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES 2007

Studies of the environment, and our collective responsibility to manage and sustain it, form an important part of the curriculum of all earning areas across the school. Through their studies of the environment, students develop an awareness of broader and more complex global issues and become more aware of the connections between subject content and the real world. Environment is one of the nternationalBaccalaureateAreasofInteraction.

Examples of issues explored by students include global warming, Kyoto protocol, ozone layer, alternative energy sources, acid rain, arid environment, salinity, wetlands, environmental impact of mining, ecosystems and endangered species. Teachers help students gain an understanding of concepts and issues at the personal, local and global levels and guide investigations through the following perspectives:

- awareness
- responsibility
- action
- reflection

In their study of "Living Things", Year 8 Science students were required to compare and contrast the life of an animal in its natural environment with that in captivity, Some classes visited the Adelaide Zoo and some the Gorge Wildlife Park to view the animals in captivity and gather information for their assignment. In particular they focussed on endangered species and the roles that zoos and wildlife parks can play in helping to prevent their extinction.

With Global Warming and Climate Change being so topical, students have been investigating a range of associated issues. For example, Ms Madden's year 10 Science class have investigated water conservation and have developed a water probe to sense the water content of the soil and automatically turn on and off a dripper system. The focus of National Science Week was Antarctic Science, and the importance of protecting our polar regions, with their delicate ecosystems, from the impacts of global warming. As 2007 was International Polar year, this was very appropriate.


its muscles and he was almost as muscled as me – ha, ha! It was called "Big Red" and was painted by Paul Lovis from South Australia and is worth \$1,500.



contemporary society, computer use has become a favoured method for students. both for entertainment and study. We ask that students of English set language for proofreading in Australian English, despite the invasion of American culture and language. And the biggy - no matter how intelligent and swift the computer is, it does not recognise different spellings of words. Any hapless year 8 in my class knows that we have lessons on difficult pairs, or should that be pears or pares? This is why students still need to focus on the basic skills in English and why we still have to teach them. Sea, I knead two point this ought from time too time.

Don't worry about the cane. Bring back the book!

In one of my favourite Australian films and also one of our senior visual texts, Beneath Clouds, Lena and Vaughn, the two main characters are having a discussion. Vaughn, who is on the run, thinks that books are stupid, but Lena tells him that books are useful, that we learn from them.

Lena: I read stuff, different books and that.

We know that reading and literacy are closely linked, and that to function at even the most basic level, people need to be literate. This is one of the major reasons that in years 8 and 9 we participate in the Premier's Reading Challenge, Students are expected to make an effort to read at least four core books and hopefully another eight, in order to gain this award. We all know the old adage about taking a horse to water and hoping it will drink, so next year, there will be verification tasks on extension reading for all year 8 and 9 students, embedded into our English curriculum. Anyway, please enjoy any poetry, creative writing, and in fact, any writing you find in this year book, Remember, books are the building blocks of communication, from ABC to surfing the web!

YouTube

SHS introduced YouTube into the curriculum this year. This is a Web Community sile where people around the world save video clips that they have made and are willing to share with others worldwide. Teachers and students are using this Web 2.0 technology as part of the student learning process. If has been a success. YouTube also compliments ClickView, SHS's internal Video Server that houses educational videos, which are streamed to students in classrooms.

Muses (ClickView Digital Video Server)

80 new educational DVD titles have been added to SHS's ClickView Server "Muses". The titles are contemporary Australian productions aimed at education across all Learning Areas and across all Year Levels from Reception to Yr 12. Each title comes with electronic copies of student worksheets, answer sheets, and staff instruction notes that are streamed through SHS's network.

SabreNet Internet (high speed internet)

DECS has chosen SHS as one of six school to pilot a high speed fibre optic connection directly to their office in Flinders Street. This new fibre optic link means that SHS has one of the faster internet connections in Australia for a school. We have increased our transmission from 2Mbps to 250Mbps.

Hera (Citrix Server)

Hera, the Citrix Server, has been installed at SHS to allow staff to interact with the school's network via the internet. Staff are able to use files and utilize school software as if they were sitting at a school computer even though they may be anywhere in the world.

New MS Office 2007

SHS has installed the latest MS Office 2007 throughout the school – keeping in pace with the latest software available.

Atlas (Paralowie House Server)

All workstations at Paralowie House have been upgraded to a Pentium 4 1.8GHz computer. The Server has been rebuilt from scratch called ATLAS. Atlas is a Windows based server that

simulates the functions of the SHS Hercules Server.

TITAN Mentor (Staff ICT skilling)

Iwo staff members, Mr Evan Polymeneas and Ms Tara Preece have been allocated time to mentor staff in using ICT in the classroom. They assist staff by adding ICT aspects to their curriculum, and by getting them ICT Certificate 1 qualified. They also run lunchtime training sessions for staff.

District T&D - Yr 7-8 Student Profile Web Database

Mr. Simon Strapps (Systems Technician) and I have developed a district based Web Database for all the primary school and high schools in our region. We ran T&D sessions for the local primary and secondary schools' staff, teaching them how to use the Yr7-8 Student Profile Web Database that helps high schools create and balance Yr 8 classes for the following year.

New Admin Server

A new Admin Server was installed at SHS to improve the efficiency and speed of all the administration work within the school. The new server is four times faster than the previous server.

New PE Mini Theatre Computer Suite

26 iMac computers, a multimedia projector, speakers, and a TV/Radio/DVD amplifier have been permanently setup in a PE classroom to create a PE Mini Theatre Computer Suite for PE classes to use.

New Home Ec. Mini Theatre

A multimedia projector, speakers, and a TV/ Radio/DVD amplifier was permanently installed in the Home Ec. Kitchen for use by the Home Ec staff to leach students using ClickView, YouTube, Powerpoint, and other Internet resources.

Goodbye to the CRT; Hello to Flatscreens We have replaced over 2/3 rd's of the old TV type monitors (CRT's) for more energy efficient flat-screens around the school. We have over 600 modern computers in the school; over 400 now have modern flat screens.



The HPE faculty have had a busy year teaching PE and Health at Salisbury High School. 2007 has seen the IBMYP PE program, including some Health components, being taught and assessed at Year 8, 9 and 10. Physical Education and Health have also been taught as stand alone subjects in Year 11 and 12. This year has also seen the VET Sport and Recreation course run successfully for a third year to senior students.

MIDDLE SCHOOL

Some highlights for the year in the middle years has been the continuing success of SEPEP (Sport Education in a PE program.) SEPEP is where a sport is extended over 5-6 weeks, so students are exposed to the skills and rules in more detail and then participate in a tournament. The students learn to work in teams and take on team roles, such as captain or coach and students must also take on the responsibility of their warm-ups and also have duty roles where they learn to score and umpire in a sport. It is very rewarding for students and we have seen it work well so far in Basketball, Volleyball, Soccer and Floor Hockey.

Jump Rope as part of Movement Composition, has been another exciting IBMYP component that has been taught throughout 2007. Jump Rope is introduced in Year 8 and then revisited in Year 9 and 10. Students develop and practice different Jump Rope skills over the 3 years and in groups create their own movement composition and perform it to the class.

SENIOR SCHOOL

The senior classes have done well this year in both the practical and theory components, as it can be quite a rigorous program at times. This year has seen the students learn about topics such as Exercise Physiology, Nutrition, Sports Appreciation and Biomechanics, Students have tried their hand at sports such as Lawn Bowls, Tennis, Basketball and Badminton.

The Yr11/12 VET Sport and Recreation course has seen the students undertake programs such as the SportsMed course that looked at Injury prevention and Treatment in Sport situations They also looked at Careers in the Sport and Recreation field and OHSW in the workplace The students also completed a Football and Netball Umpiring course that allows them to take their skills further if they wish. Students completed an Essential for Coaching children course that involved planning a sports coaching session of their choice, in which they presented to the Year 8 students in Term 3 and then at Direk Primary school in Term 4. The students were also required to take on a coaching/umpiring role for a term within the Salisbury Weekly Sport program and also at 2 carnivals throughout the year. Lastly students in Term 4 were required to undertake work experience in a field related to the Sport and Recreation Industry, Students organised work experience in places such as Curves Fitness Centre, Salisbury Bowling Club, Jetty Surf, Sportpower and a variety of Primary schools in their PE department. Students will receive a certificate of attainment at the end of the year to gain credit towards further studies at TAFE if they choose to.



Science

2007 has been another eventful year for Science students at Salisbury High, with many exciting activities being offered to broaden their experience and engage in a meaningful way in Science and Technology.

YEAR 12 EXTENSION STUDIES

This year, John Coaby, Simon Klaassen-Smith and Natasha Reddy (right) have worked with final year Engineering students from UniSA and Engineers from Tenix, on an engineering project. They have designed, constructed and tested an airship whose flight can be remotely controlled via an operator interface. The controls permit variation of speed, allitude and direction.

NAMIG Project

Minthe NAMIG (Northern Advanced Manufacturing Industries Group) Concept 2 Creation project. The students worked in teams to develop a product from an idea to a reality. In so doing, they modeled closely the processes used in industry. The focus was on electronics and a number of different projects were constructed and presented at the Concept—2-Creation Expo at the Playford Civic Centre on 21st November, 2007

YEAR 11 CODAN INDUSTRY PROJECT

Three year 11 students, Tristan Kahl, Steph New and Ben Nitschke (below), have formed a team of students constructing a project for Codan Electronics Industry. The project involved designing and building 8 synchronous digital clocks (all showing identical times) controlled using a radio signal from a central control computer. They also had to write the computer software to control the clocks.



ROBOTICS PEER MENTORING

The Robotics Peer Mentoring Program was delivered to Mrs Stewart's Year 10 Science Extension class. The response from students in the program has been excellent with many appreciating the apportunity to be involved in assembling and soldering electronics components and learning how to use the software to control the functioning of the robots SCIENCE AND ENGINEERING CHALLENGE

Earlier this year, a group of thirty year 9 and 10 students participated in the Science and Engineering Challenge held at the Adelaide SuperDrome. The students warked in teams on activities including constructing a cataput, building bridges, designing a moon buggy and hovercraft. All students worked effectively as team members and Salisbury High finished a creditable 4th out of the 8 teams competing on the day. The level of engagement of our students and their ability to apply their knowledge and skills was commendable.







YEAR 10 ASISTM PROJECT

During second semester, Miss Madden's year 10 extension Science class has been involved in the ASISTM Project (which stands for "Australian Schools innovation in Science, Technology and Mathematics"). Essentially, this project has been designed to integrate Mathematics, Science and IT into an Electronics project, giving students some experience in the aspects of engineering as a career, Funding for the project became available through a government grant, the process for establishing the project at Salisbury High, and in other schools, began in late 2005.

Students began the project by looking at water conservation and why it is important, the idea being that the major part of the project is to build and program a moisture probe which monitors water levels in a pot plant and tells the owner when the plant needs more water. This would hopefully prevent over watering. From there students learnt about electricity, Circuit boards, and electrical components. They learnt how to solder components into a printed circuit board and where the components needed to be placed on the board for them to function correctly in tandem.

Towards the end of the project, students investigated the possibility of using the moisture probe on a larger scale, for example, attaching it to the school's watering system, and what problems they may face with actually doing this in practice. Students were also helped along the way by a Student Mentor from TAFE SA, Douglas Tilbrook, who helped troubleshoot when issues arose and shared his enthusiasm for electronics with the students.

The hope at the end of the project was to have the students considering electronics, particularly engineering, as a career path. Having a number of engineering companies so close in proximity to Salisbury High and many of these companies looking for employees who can work in this field, the opportunity for students to gain employment in this area are high,

December, all expenses paid, to attend the young people's Christmas Lectures at the Royal Institution of Great Britain. As well as attending the Christmas lectures, Lisa will visit sites of scientific importance in London and sites of historic and cultural importance.

Lisa will form part of a group of 10 young South Australian students who were selected because of their demonstrated interest in Science and Mathematics; their student leadership skills; their ability to work collaboratively, manage new situations and take personal responsibility; and their confidence in public speaking.

These scholarships, established in 2005, are an exciting offshoot of the Adelaide Thinkers residency of Baroness Professor Susan Greenfield. The 2007 lectures Back from the Brink: the science of survival, will be delivered by Hugh Montgomery, a diver, skydiver, mountaineer, intensive care doctor, genetics researcher and director of the UCL Institute of Human Health and Performance.

We are very proud of Lisa for being a successful candidate. We wish her well for her trip and know that she will be a wonderful ambassador for Salisbury High School and South Australia.




We had to use hair nets when we were working with food bars, and gloves when we were working with sharp or dirty objects.

After we had done that we introduced ourselves to the group and spoke about what we hoped to get out of the program; Jake and I hoped to get more confidence and motivation towards our future. Jake said he wanted to be a comedian but "everyone laughs at you" so he changed his mind and decided to join the army or N.A.S.A. instead. I said I wanted to join the army too, then when my term expired, I plan to go to Jni and study politics. Jake and I thought our goals were always just out of reach, but by talking through

what we had to do to get to where we wanted to be, we realised our goals were possible if we broke them down into several smaller steps.

Of course it wasn't all serious; we had a good laugh from time to time, Christie and Stewie (our excellent trainers) had some fantastic stories to tell. After each session, we had to give a different person in the room a good comment, now there were around eighteen of us so it was pretty nerve-racking the first time because you were like 'oh god, what am I gonna say, I barely even know them," pretty much everyone had difficulty the first time, but as you progressed you got to know everyone and it became easier. There was also the bit where you said or answered a question, when that part came, you could hear the crickets outside; eventually though, you found yourself putting your hand up, and when you realised you had, you sort of found yourself wondering, 'how did that get up there?" This feeling was soon replaced by amazement when you said what you thought and everyone listened and took in what you said.

Youth Op, is a fantastic program, especially if you're suffering from poor self esteem, you meet new people and you find out a few truths about yourself; Jake and I would strongly recommend it to anyone and everyone.





