

REMEMBRANCE DAY LEST WE FORGET



A Remembrance Day ceremony was held at Salisbury High School on Friday 11 November 2011 to commemorate all of the fallen soldiers, including many Aboriginal soldiers. An acknowledgment wall has been developed by the school in partnership with the RSL (the Returned and Services League).



The wall was funded by an \$8,000 grant from the Premier's Department.

They were excited about the prospect of the memorial, as was the RSL when they were contacted. A committee was formed with the local RSL and Indigenous members, Helen Somerville, Nita Combeer, and Ros Coleman. Together, they planned and implemented the building of the memorial wall and organised most of the plaques in collaboration with Elaine Warner and Dennis Graham, an Indigenous student (FLO).

The idea for the memorial came from the Humanities and Aboriginal Education teams as they wanted to include more information about Indigenous contributions to the armed forces in schooling.

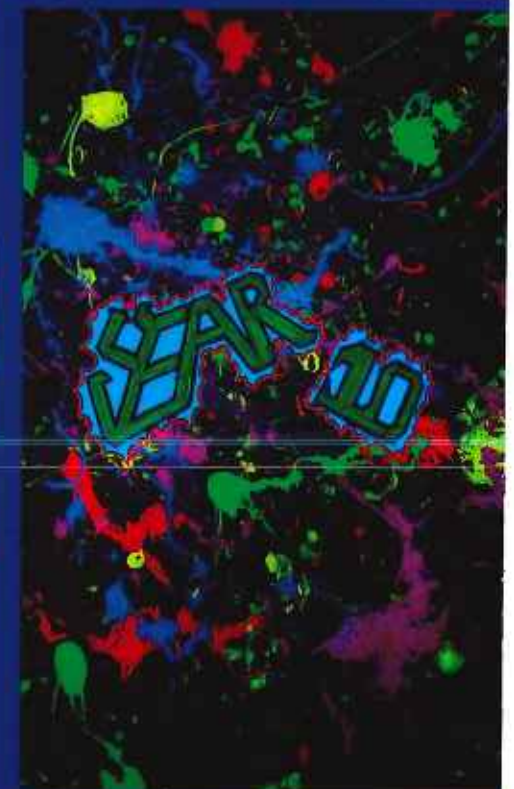

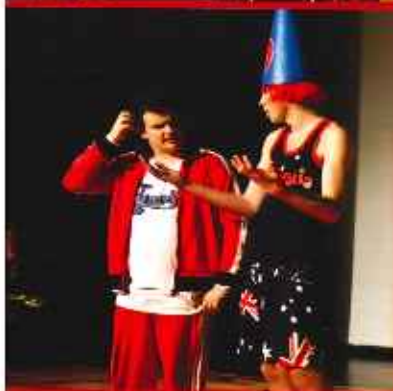
HIGH SCHOOL SPOOF-ICAL

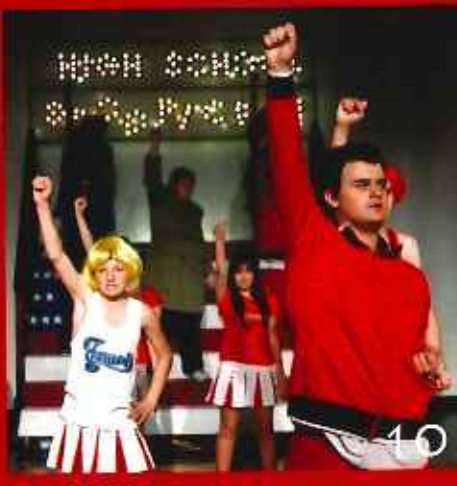

SWD AGRICULTURE



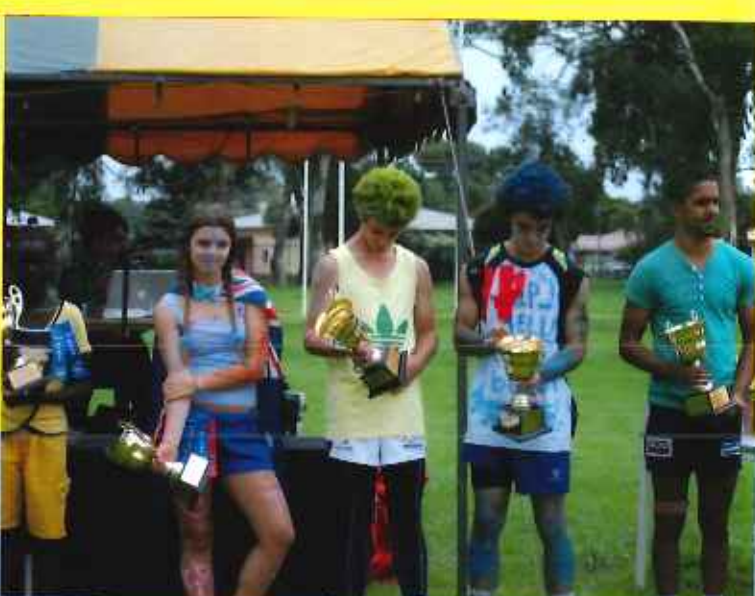
This year has been the trial run of an agriculture class in Special Education. Students have learned about fencing, horse handling and planting wheat crops for hay.

SPEECH DAY

Chairperson of the Governing Council Speech Day Address

Today, I want to talk about Search Engines. Perhaps this topic seems slightly bizarre, but I believe that using this concept as an analogy has some relevance for the school leavers this year, and a message for the rest of us.

When we think of Google, the most popular Search Engine (the 2nd most popular, you might be interested to discover, is Youtube), we sometimes forget that there are other, similar computer facilities, such as Zuula, Bing, Ebsco, Dogpile and Yahoo, for instance, and it is this diversity of approaches to locating information that is reflected in the variety of individuals in our school community. When working with some of the Year 12 students this year, I marvelled at the range of personalities, the differences in their learning styles, the uniqueness of each persona – and how great this is.

As the Year 12s and 13s move into an environment beyond secondary school, I want them to realise how special they each are, how inimitable they are in their own worlds of family, employment and potential for happiness and success.

Search Engines allow us to 'explore, investigate and analyse'. These are Research Project terms that no doubt are increasingly familiar to Senior School students. Our 2011 graduates have proven that they have enquiring minds – they know how to ask what to learn, how to learn it, how to improve and how to rise to the challenge of academic requirements.

Yet, this need to acquire and apply knowledge goes far beyond study in individual subjects – it is a lifelong curiosity, and I believe our students are equipped with the skills to adapt; they have a growth mindset and are confident enough to search for the best in their futures.

I am reminded of Arnold Munk's children's story about the little blue train engine attempting to climb what seems an impossibly steep hill. As he chugs along, he repeats the mantra to himself: "I think I can, I think I can, I think I can." Then, when he has courageously reached the top and travels down the other side, the engine states: "I thought I could, I thought I could." This tale was written to celebrate the value of optimism and hard work. Preparedness for the future means that we can accept and face any tests or trials ahead, and never forget the pursuit of excellence in what we do.

On behalf of the Salisbury High School Governing Council, I wish this year's graduates all the very best. You are the engines and I am sure that your searches will lead you to exciting futures, whatever they are and wherever they occur.

SWD CAMP

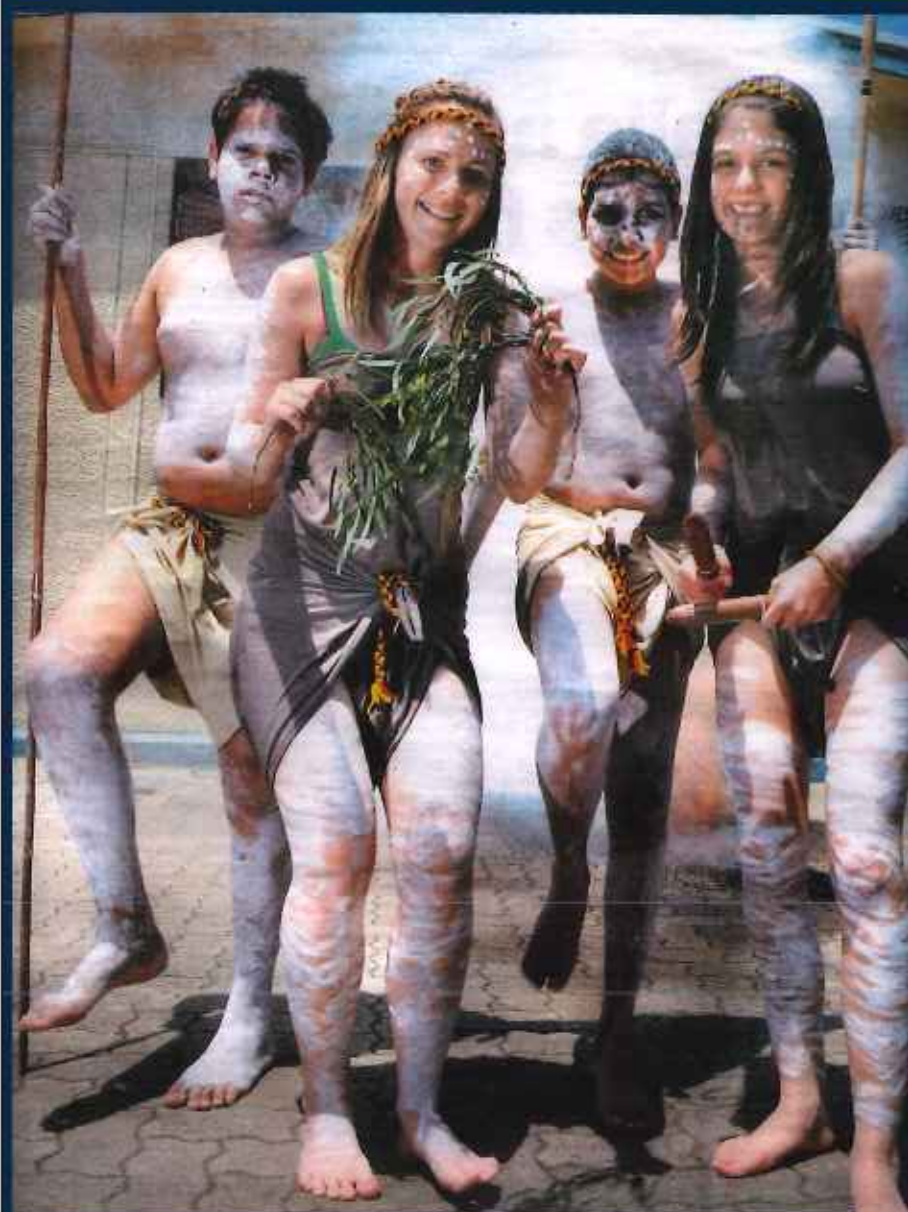

LIPDUB



Video brings school together

NERVES were forgotten once the cameras started rolling for a once-only, 10-minute performance by Salisbury High School students and staff for a lip-dub video.

Two students from the Year 10 digital media class simultaneously filmed 900 students and 75 staff lip-

synching to music, along with choreographed dance moves, to create a YouTube video.

Old scholar and digital media teacher Ryan Westell said he saw a potential education fit with the International Baccalaureate Middle Years Program after reading about the popularity of lip-dub videos on a North American education blog.

The challenge for the 13 students in charge of the project was to work out how to involve the whole school and promote the school's cultural diversity.

The Year 8 students, who are learning the Kurna language, wanted to perform a traditional dance they had been taught by teacher Jack Buckskin.

On 16th November 2011 all the staff and students at Salisbury High School took part in the LipDub Project.

It was an amazing accomplishment which required a huge amount of planning and preparation. It was produced by the Year 10 Digital Media class under the guidance of Mr Westell and took over 10 weeks in pre-production.

The idea came from a North American educational blog that showed the "top-ten" LipDub videos from US high schools. It was initially aimed at generating some interest in video production but soon evolved into a full-blown, technically difficult and high standard production.

The first step was choosing the music to use and the class decided on The Potbelleez's Don't Hold Back and Sneaky Sound System's UFO, two Australian artists to help identify the video as one of the first Australian LipDubs.

The music was edited, mixed together and then the choreographing of the cameras was planned and practiced. We slowed the music down so that the video could be sped up to provide some more visual interest.

The video was shot on two cameras simultaneously, choreographed to within a few seconds to allow the cameras to cross over in the middle and meet up at the end. The project involved students learning about a range of film making skills relating to camera, sound, and editing, and developing skills in collaboration, organisation and time management.

The credits sequence involved an acoustic version of Don't Hold Back, performed by Jordan Ruru, one of our year 12 students. Her version was incredible, and provided an impressive ending to an amazing video. The recording of the song is now being considered for a covers album called Uncovered, released each year by The Ministry Of Sound, agents for The Potbelleez.





The finished video was uploaded to YouTube on December 1 and received over 4000 views within the first week. It was featured on the Adelaide Now website and local Messenger Press, and has appeared on websites around the world, including the blog that originally inspired the video. The feedback and comments were extremely positive, none more so than from Ilan Kidron, a.k.a. iKid, the lead singer of The Potbelleez, who sent an email to the school and then phoned to congratulate us and express his interest in visiting the school in 2012. He wrote:

*Dear Salisbury High School,
Words can not express the immense fulfillment and ecstatic joy I got from watching your clip online just now. Congratulations on making the most captivating video of our music I've ever seen, including ones we've spent thousands of dollars on!*

To Mr. Westell and all the students and teachers involved all I can say is unbelievable and thank you!!!!

I am going to make every effort to come and visit and perform and hopefully collaborate with you next year if that sounds good.
