The Student Representative Council at Salisbury High adheres to giving all students a voice in their school and the local community. We meet every second week to set and achieve outcomes relevant to the student body and the many charities we support.

Congratulations to the above students for being nominated and awarded the prestigious Australian Vocational Student Prize for 2011. In addition to receiving the prize, each student was awarded \$2000 in prize money. The Australian Vocational Student Prize (AVSP) recognises outstanding Year 12 students who have demonstrated exceptional skill, commitment and achievement whilst undertaking a Vocational Education and Training (VET) in Schools Program or Australian School-based Apprenticeship (ASbA) as part of their senior secondary studies. These four Salisbury High School students excelled in their vocational training by completing Certificate III industry recognised training and SACE.

Salisbury High CSI

In the closing weeks of Term 2, 10 budding young science students from Years 10 and 11 came together to take part in the Chemical Murder Mystery Workshop at Flinders University. The workshop was a hands-on look into the world of forensic science and exposed students to many of the analytical techniques used by real forensic scientists in the field to help solve cases. Atomic-Absorption Spectroscopy (AAS), Mass Spectrometry (MS), High Performance Liquid Chromatography (HPLC) and several other acronym-friendly experiments were conducted by students in order to solve a fake/real case.

Our Salisbury High students did exceptionally well, and were able to offer valuable information to help put the pieces of the puzzle together and solve the crime.

Literacy and Numeracy Week



This week was celebrated in a variety of ways.

In Maths classes students were asked: If you weighed all the books in your library, would they be heavier than an elephant? If you stacked them all in a pile, would they be higher than the school roof? Student answers were submitted to the national database.

Walls of Mathematics: The first of the Maths Word Walls was created by Year 9 Link Maths students. Students have been working on a project collecting data and were discussing all of the words they were using associated with statistics and graphing. This process helped the students in their understanding.

The school diary and 5 cent pieces - what's the connection? Students were challenged to work out how many 5 cent pieces it would take to completely cover the school diary.

Quality student writing has been the focus of the Literacy challenge with students asked to submit what they consider to be their best piece of writing.

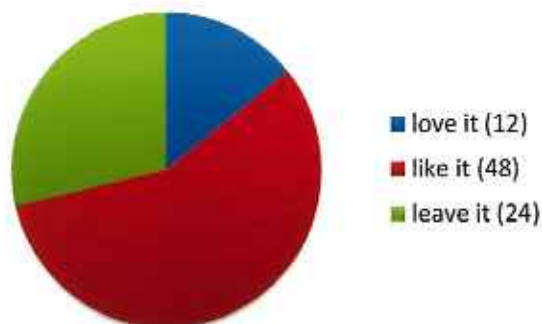


National Year of Reading 2012

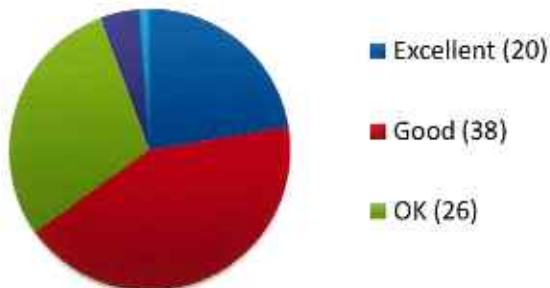
2012 was the National Year of Reading and the Resource Centre ran various activities including a Wall of Quotes.

Aboriginal Education

Congratulations to our Year 12 Aboriginal students. We are very proud of their achievements in 2012.

- 16 Aboriginal students began Year 12 in 2012.
- 15 completed their SACE this year.
- 3 students received an ATAR.
- A grades achieved in Terms 1 to 3 = 29.
- B grades achieved in Terms 1 to 3 = 40.

Students have completed VET through Traineeships, Certificate 2 and 3 Child Studies, Certificate 2 Hairdressing and Certificate 2 Aged Care. Their anticipated career pathways include Teacher, Social Worker, Indigenous Studies, Sports Based traineeships, AFL stars, Child Care, Apprenticeships, TAFE and Police Officer.

Awards achieved in 2012 for Year 12 students are Zonta Award, NAIDOC Sports person of the Year, NAIDOC Youth of the Year, Regional Academic Excellence winner, Regional Sports persons, SAATA Power Cup competition - 5 out of 8 awards were won.

Well done to the Year 12 students and the Aboriginal Education staff.



Inauguration of War Memorial



An event celebrating Reconciliation Week was held on Wednesday 30th May. Our School was fortunate to win a grant from the ANZAC Day Commemoration Council to build the memorial, honouring both Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal armed forces members, who served Australia in past conflicts.

The concept behind the grant was the realisation that throughout Australia's history, recognition of the important contributions of Aboriginal armed forces members has, too often, been understated. We want our students to understand this and our teaching about Australia's involvement in war to address the issues in a positive way. The memorial has given us a focal point from which to teach and learn about Australia's involvement in war and for students to give honour to the past.

The wall commemorates all fallen soldiers, including Aboriginal soldiers, and was funded by an \$8000 grant from the Premier's Department.

The mural painted by Dennis Graham, an Aboriginal FLO student, takes the iconic image of a stylised Australian setting at sunset, reflecting on the words, literally, "in the morning we shall remember them".

A \$1,500 cheque was presented by Leesa Vlahos Member for Taylor on behalf of Jack Snellin, Minister for Veterans Affairs. We also thank Bill Hignett from the Aboriginal Veterans Commemorative Service Committee for the presentation of books to our school.

ANZAAS



Congratulations to Mary-Anne Frost who was selected to represent Australia (1 of only 25 in Australia) at this year's Youth ANZAAS (The Australian and New Zealand Association for the Advancement of Science) in New Zealand.

This is an annual residential international forum for Science students in Years 10 to 12. She travelled to Dunedin, New Zealand for the first week in July which coincided with the University of Otago International Festival of Science. During her stay she experienced behind-the-scenes tours, lectures with leading scientists, hands on research and the use of cutting edge technology.

"It was a truly awe inspiring experience and one I will not forget. I experienced many things like the Anatomy Museum, a lecture with Sir Ray Avery, New Zealander of the Year for his invention of technology to produce low cost intraocular lenses, met the wondrous Stephanie Wilson, a NASA astronaut and attended a farewell dinner at Larnach Castle, the only castle in New Zealand.

I would like to thank the school tremendously for giving me the chance to go on such a life changing trip and encourage others to apply next year."

UniSA Maths Prize

Congratulations to Samuel Nitschke who was accepted to participate in this year's inaugural UniSA Maths Prize. The award is for Year 11 students who demonstrate an interest in a mathematically-based career and who have achieved high grades in Maths subjects. The Prize is designed to enhance students' interest and knowledge of Maths through a one day 'Experience' at UniSA. The 'Experience' provided students with a series of hands-on workshops, a career/industry session to discover mathematical based careers and pathways to further education.

"I participated in this program which started with a learning workshop. We worked in teams and were given problems to solve. It was fun to collaborate with people my own age out of school.

Morning tea was provided and then we were shown around the campus, including the planetarium.

After lunch we had more workshops. The day finished with talking to a range of Uni students and professors on where the world of Mathematics can take you. Participants received a certificate and a \$75 voucher. The day was a great experience and I encourage students to persist in their Mathematical skills as there are plenty of opportunities for students who excel in Mathematics."



Australian Maths Competition

On Thursday 2nd August the Australian Mathematics Competition (AMC) was held for the 35th time.

The aims of the Competition are three-fold:

1. To highlight the importance of mathematics as a curriculum subject.
2. To give students an opportunity to discover talent in mathematics.
3. To provide resources for the classroom and general discussion.

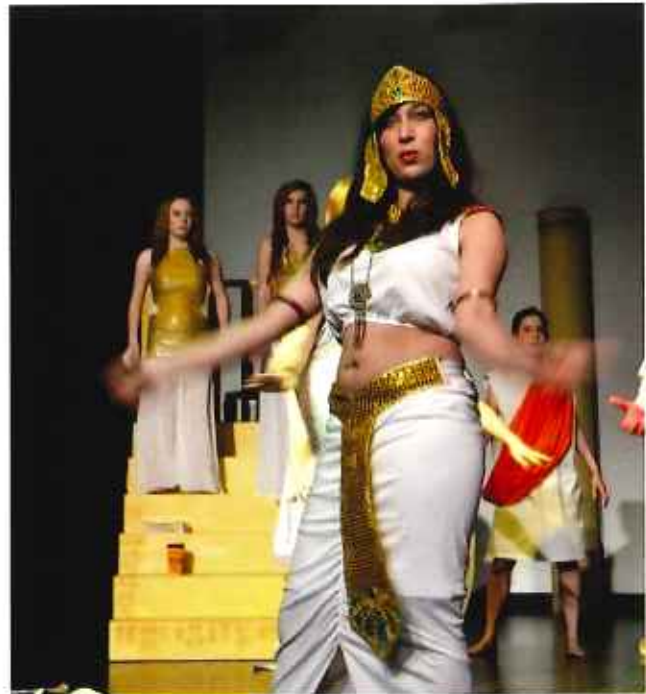

- The Aspirations Film Project (see below)

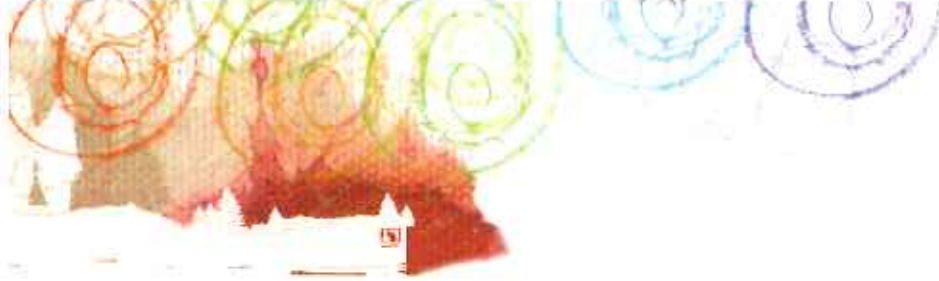
Aspirations Film Project

Language Perfect at Salisbury High

Language students are very excited as we have purchased SKIWI, a software licence for 300 students to have access to this software vocabulary tool which is integrated into the Italian, Japanese and Chinese curriculum. Language Perfect encourages students to focus on vocabulary learning at home in a fun way. At school they are keen to use what they have learned in their writing and conversation.

Students gain points for every word they learn, and can therefore compete against their friends in a fun, educational and safe environment at their own pace.

The Language Perfect World Championships were held in May. All students at Salisbury High School were registered to participate. Students compete for their class, school and country against other students around the world, by earning points in a range of foreign languages.



Home Economics News - Textiles

In Term 2 the Year 9 Textiles Class created a single bed quilt. Each student sewed four individual squares to form one large square. These pieces were then used to complete the quilt. The end result was impressive and the students were proud of their achievements.

The quilt made by these students was donated to the Special Education Basketball Carnival and was raffled to raise much needed funds for the event.

Stage 2 Tourism - Clipsal 500 Excursion



As part of the Year 12 Tourism course students did a case study on planning and managing a sustainable tourism event. This involved an excursion to the Clipsal 500 to enable them to analyse and experience the event and conduct surveys to reveal tourists' perceptions.

Students experienced a wide range of attractions which the event had on offer including watching the Formula Fords, having a photo in the "pocket rocket" Aussie Cars, watching the V8 development series, touring the V8 Supercar paddock and experiencing the Disney Pixar Race Cage (not to be confused with the SHS PBL Rage Cage!).



Students confirmed that the event is important for our State, bringing both economic and social benefits. It is deemed economically sustainable through creation of employment opportunities and stimulation of the local economy. With over 270,000 spectators visiting the event over the four days, environmental impacts were assessed and students determined that recycling initiatives were in place. The event is committed to becoming environmentally sustainable through carbon offset schemes and a new agreement which ensures the V8s are fuelled by E85 (85% ethanol and 15% unleaded fuel). This is great news for our environment and encourages road car drivers to make the switch to an ethanol blend to help sustain the environment.

Overall, the day was a success and students are more aware of management strategies that event organisers have put in place to ensure the Clipsal is a success which the rest of us can enjoy!

Excerpts from the Camp Journal written by **Danielle Gray**.

DAY ONE - it was what everyone had been waiting for, Camp Day. Waking up at 6.00am to be ready and at school by 7.30am was definitely a down side and the worst way to start a camp.

We were soon at Mambray Creek, around 12.40pm. After stretching for a while we started to unpack the trailer.

Once we were assigned our group we were shown what to pack in our rucksacks. When they had been packed we were given instructions about emergencies, and what to do if we were falling behind. After packing we were ready to set off.

As we were all excited we started to walk off really fast, we were walking on flat ground and all you could see on the ground were rocks and sticks. After walking for five minutes we came across a medium sized but really steep hill. It didn't look too bad but after getting half way up, I realised it was. Some of the boys sped up the hill and found they were more tired than the rest of us. When we all reached the top we took some layers of clothing off and started heading towards our destination.

Afterwards we all sat in a circle and started talking. I was so tired from walking all day that I decided that I was ready for bed. Maddy and Demi asked us to go in their tent to do a video recording of our first day of camp. We recorded ourselves talking about what we missed. I missed my family and my boyfriend.

DAY TWO - The second day had arrived. It was about 7.00 when we woke up. I stayed in bed for another ten minutes and finally decided I had better get up when Mr Alleway and Kate said "Come on girls hurry up, you still have to put your tents down".

Walking through the Gorge was kind of hard but kind of easy. There were tonnes of rock that we had to climb over, tree branches that we had to duck under and tree stumps that we had to climb over. I had thought they were all difficult but there came a part in the Gorge where you had five steps that were really close together so it was really steep and we had to climb up that. It had looked really simple but it had taken up so much energy.

DAY 2 (Contd) - We had reached the top at about two thirty. When I reached the top the first thing I did was take the rucksack off my back, have a drink and something to eat. About twenty minutes later just as we were about to leave, Jessie, Sophie, Jelyn and Taylor had reached the top, so my group congratulated them by giving them a clap. As Mr Alleway was now our leader he had to pick which way to go. One way was quicker, but rougher, and the other was longer, but smoother and because we all wanted to get to our camp site we decided to go the quicker way, unfortunately the quickest way isn't always the best way.

I had thought about walking up that hill was bad, but I had only just started walking down, and I hated it already. We had walked for about ten minutes, Demi had pulled her calf muscle and Mr Alleway was complaining because he can't walk down a hill properly. After stopping to make sure Demi was alright we headed off again. During the next few hours the whistles were over used. The whistles were usually bown because people needed a break, people were sore but others just blew the whistle because they were sick of people walking too far in front.

DAY 3 - Reaching the camp site was the best feeling, knowing that I had walked over twenty kilometres in the past three days, knowing that I was going home, is a feeling that's indescribable.

At the camp site we waited for the other two groups and then we were ready to go. Everyone had jumped into a bus and we were off. During the bus ride home people fell asleep, people were talking and most of us were singing.

We were told before camp that, "like it or hate it, we would not forget it!" and that will certainly be the case for me.

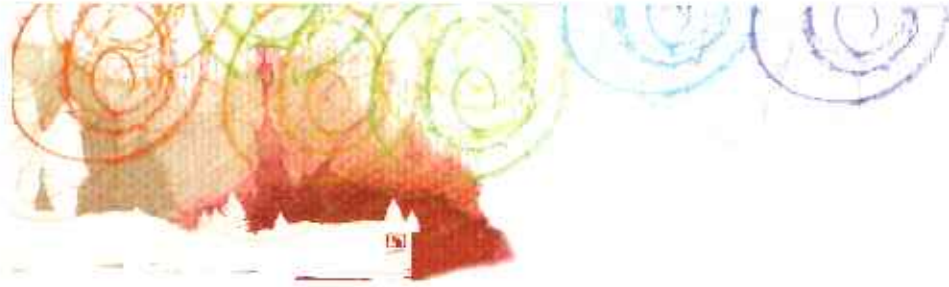

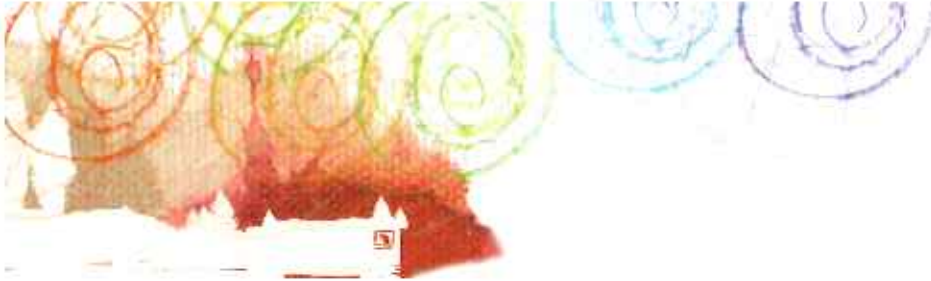
World's Greatest Shave
