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From the Principal



2023 has experienced a more settled start to the year. The Year 7s have settled in quickly and the recent Year 7 welcome night was a great chance to connect with families. It also provided the opportunity for families to meet their child's care teacher. Communication with care teachers and the school is critical in accessing support and

solving problems. Your connection with your child's care teacher is very important and one that we highly value. Most parents of Year 7 teachers will share the next 4 years of their child's schooling communicating with the care teacher to support each other. It was lovely to hear from families of how positive their child felt about the start of their high school life.

The focus at present is on providing quality teaching and learning experiences. Covid is still lurking with a few cases reported, but generally has had little impact on our site so far this year. However, please remember to keep your child home if they are unwell.

The work in our classroom underpins our 3 Site Improvement Goals. The focus on reading is intense and committed and will be ongoing. Professional development and regular classroom observations will support the work we do. The Literacy Learning Intervention program began in full force in week 2 with every student in Year 8 and 9 who are not yet reading to their age level, now receiving support 2 times per week. All Year 7 and 8 students were tested to identify the students who require the support. The energy and progress evident in these support sessions is exciting, as the students embrace the process of improving their reading skills. The focus on numeracy skills in Year 7 and 8 has increased with 2 full time support staff testing and identifying students who require additional support. We are also working with our teachers to help support them develop the skills needed to support students with poor numeracy skills. A Cross Curricular Numeracy team has been established and the development of improving numeracy skills will be a whole school approach. Our updated Site Improvement Plan is

located on our website and we are now in the first year of a 3-year plan.

The goal of maintaining and improving our SACE results will also continue to be integral on our Site Improvement Plan.

The 2020 Annual Report is now complete and will be attached to our school website.

I would like to congratulate the students and staff for their proactive approach in regards to the banning of mobile phones on site, under most circumstances, at our school. The new mobile phone policy was embraced by our site and the change in culture at Salisbury HS has been impressive. Within one day the school adopted the new policy and mobile phones are no longer visible on site. For a very small number of students there have been consequences, but the breaches are diminishing daily. We were so impressed by our students that we gave out free zooper doopers at lunchtime to all students who had not had a mobile phone breach. We also allowed them to have their phones for Sports Day. Students have been compliant and respectful.

The process is as follows:

Mobile phones and headphones should not be visible at any time during the school day.

1st breach: The phone/device will be handed in to the front office for the day.

2nd breach: The phone/device will be handed in to the front office for the day and parents will be notified by email.

3rd breach: The phone/device will be handed in to the front office for the day. An internal suspension will occur and parent/caregivers contacted.

4th breach: The phone/device will be handed in to the front office at the beginning of the day for 5 days. Home will be contacted by Front Office.

5th breach: Immediate take home and 1-day external suspension.

Ongoing phone breaches will be dealt with using case-by-case management.

Late last year the school revisited our school values with the parents, students and staff via electronic surveys. As a result, for the first time in many years we have 3 new values. They are respect, kindness and achievement. We will use these values as the foundations for all we do and explicitly teach them through our care program. This has been implemented as part of the renewed focus on Positive Behaviours for Learning. The school has won a grant of \$30,000 over 3 years to improve and reenergize our work in this area.

A positive education focus has been implemented in all care programs across Years 7-12. This will provide students with tools and strategies to think and act positively taking into consideration mindset, achievement, self-esteem, relationships, etc. We have a strong 14+ PBL team that are revisiting our processes to support positive learning in every classroom at our school.

Another great Sports Day was held in week 7. Attendance and spirits were very high. The weather was near perfect and a special thanks to Ashley de Pasquale, our Sports Coordinator,

for leading the organisation and our entire staff, for their commitment and enthusiasm in ensuring a great day was had by all. It was great to see so many parents attend as well. I felt we had the biggest parent turnout since pre-covid times which added to the atmosphere of the day. A special thanks to Sergeant Jason Gilchrist and our local police officers for providing me with 2 police cars for my entrance. With sirens blazing it was a great start to the day and showed great community support. This event was followed by a large number of our students heading off to the Bridgestone Athletics complex to compete against other metropolitan schools in the A grade division. As always, our students were proud ambassadors for our school. They showed tremendous spirit in a very competitive field.

Wellbeing Day was held again in Term 1 this year. For almost a decade now, Salisbury High School has been organising an annual Wellbeing Day event. On this half day event, we promote mental health and wellbeing and connect wellbeing related services to our school community. Popular external agencies like Headspace, Relationships Australia, MYSA, Salvation Army etc, have supported our school with their participation. Participation of the agencies range from running a wellbeing stall to promoting their services and engaging with students through interactive games and/or delivering a Wellbeing focused presentation. When students engage with these service providers they get an opportunity to establish positive community relationships and at the same time be aware of supports that are available beyond the school. And all this happens in a fun, non-confronting and engaging manner. The colour, fun and excitement was supported by lots of free food, dancing and a real opportunity to build relationships and relax in a very positive environment. A big thanks to Perri Poudel and our fantastic counselling team, plus so many others, who made this day so successful.

Carla Freedman, our EAL Coordinator held a large afterschool parent meeting for our EAL (English as an Additional Language) families. She provided interpreters and supported our families with information about SACE, senior school, school operations and DayMap. Attendance was very strong with these families who are very keen to learn more about secondary schooling in Australia. The richness in diversity at Salisbury High School makes it a very exciting school to be a part of. We were fortunate to have interpreters to help improve understanding and also shared some delicious cultural foods at the event. 


and that alone, is very exciting.

Senior School News

We continue to celebrate the school's success in 2022, in a year that was disrupted by COVID-19. Our 2022 Destination Data clearly indicates that most Year 12 students have successfully taken the next step in their career and have transitioned to Higher Education, Training or Employment.

Of the 114 students who were in Year 12, 38 students (28%) secured an apprenticeship or employment, an impressive achievement defying local employment and national employment trends. Industry recognition of quality regional VET programs, in particular CITB supported 'Doorways to Construction' and Doorways to Construction Plus Certificate III

programs in Carpentry and Bricklaying has been pivotal in the improvement.

Pathway mentoring and planning through the Care/Student Development Program and the additional support students receive from our Senior School team, in particular Brii Daniels (VET Cordinator/Careers) and Naomi Lindsay (Data Manager) have been major factors in the outstanding post school destination achievements of our students. All 31 students (27%) who intended to study at university were offered a placement with the majority securing their first choice. Of particular note was also the three fold growth in numbers of students choosing to continue their education journey via courses at TAFESA and other Vocational Education providers, some 23 students (20%) have gone on to 'further education'.

We congratulate the class of 2022 and wish them success with their career pathways.

As a school we continue to offer a wide range of SACE supports, including Special Provisions, Modified SACE and more 'flexible' Integrated Learning options and just last week the SACE Board offered some 'Subject Modifications' in response to the situation. Regardless of the supports on offer, the requirement for students to attend lessons and produce work of an acceptable standard absolutely remains. There is no 'COVID trump card' that guarantees students SACE at the end of Year 12, it still must be 'worked for' if it is to be achieved. It is crucial that Year 12s maximise their attendance in the remaining two and a half terms of their academic year. What is most surprising is the speed at which year 12 passes, now is the time for increased efforts. Many students are currently undertaking Stage 2 Research Project and this needs to be completed by the end of Semester 1, at a C grade or above, if students are to get SACE at the end of the year. Without Research Project, students will not be able to achieve SACE. Several Year 12 subject teachers will be giving up their time in the school holidays and will be running 'holiday lessons'. I really encourage students to attend.

In terms of Year 11, a considerable number of students are really struggling to come to terms with the increased academic demands and accountability of Stage 1 SACE. Students need to really increase their commitment to study and use their study line time effectively. While we encourage many students to remain at Salisbury High School to undertake Year 12, students need to 'pass' Year 11 to be prepared for the even more considerable demands of Stage 2. There is a wide range of options for those who might seek alternative to SACE completion. Please do not hesitate to contact me, if you would like to discuss any matters regarding Senior School.

VET News

VET

Salisbury High School has seen an excellent start to the year, with good attendance across all VET courses. VET is a significant commitment, as students are entering an adult learning environment where they must develop skills to balance their courses, school subjects and social lives.

It is of the upmost importance that students are **prompt** and **attend all sessions** when they are able to. If a student is absent due to illness, they need to message their Trainer and Mrs Daniels as soon as possible. Often, the trainer is able to provide the student with work they can complete while absent or when they are feeling better.

It is strongly encouraged that if a student feels as though they are struggling, they contact Mrs Daniels and speak to their VET trainer as soon as possible. There is a wide range of supports that can be provided to students if required. For example, each course has Learning Support Services and Salisbury High School has a Senior School tutor that can work with students one on one.

Students should expect to receive their VET reports by the end of term 1. This will be a great opportunity for students to reflect on their learning and ensure they are meeting expectations. It is strongly encouraged that if a student is not passing, they contact their VET instructor to seek clarification on how they can improve. When possible, instructors may be able to provide students with work they can catch up on independently during

the break. However, it is up to the student to contact their instructor to find out if this is a possibility.


If a student is interested in enrolling in a VET course in year 11, they are strongly encouraged to complete the expression of interest form. This will allow students to be notified about Industry Immersion Activities. Students need to provide evidence of industry immersion to apply for a VET course. This needs to be done by the end of term 2. Work experience is a great form of evidence. Students are encouraged to see Mrs Daniels for more information.

- Student feedback and advice about the course
- Time to ask questions

Careers News

Futurepreneurs Program

On Friday 31st March, a group of Year 10 Salisbury High students engaged in a 'Futurepreneurs' program on site as facilitated by The Smith Family. This was an all-day program offered to students whom were eager to partake in time-based challenges that fosters skills for starting their own business and/or creating products.

Our Salisbury High students were respectful throughout the on-site program, engaging with Smith Family facilitators, Greg and John, as they created innovative solutions to reducing waste in the future. Students then presented their solutions to their peers. Examples of student work can be seen below.





Mrs Daniels and Ms Milne have currently been engaging with relevant personnel such as the Smith Family and Flinders University to plan for career led opportunities across years 7-12. These ultimately support in providing engaging programs to support careers exploration.

Please see a snapshot of Careers based programs planned for Term 2 and subsequent dates

Year 7

08/05/23: Flinders River journey - Encounter - Introduces the idea of life being a journey. Facilitators share their education and career journey and begin a dialogue about tertiary pathways, careers, and qualifications. This session aims to stimulate students' interest in higher education and future opportunities and will be delivered in a care group setting.

22/05/23 TBC: Flash Mentoring facilitated by The Smith Family. Based on popular Career interests identified within a survey, students will hear from a range of guest speakers from a variety of industries. These presenters will discuss their pathways, not always a linear one, roles within industry and answer student led questions.

18/05/23 & 19/05/23: Work Inspiration - Trade Focused (University focus dates to be confirmed). Students will engage in an off-site program whereby they will learn more about themselves and engage with employers first hand. This program is employer led, focusing on creating both positive and meaningful connections to the world of work. The program will run over 2 full day sessions, the second session occurring on 19/05.

Mobile Phone Policy



2023 School Year - Mobile Free Zone

In line with new government legislation, we are excited to become a mobile free zone from the beginning of the 2023 school year.

The new policy requires all public schools to implement a ban on the use of mobile phones and smartwatches, for all students, from the time they arrive at school to the end of the school day.

This means phones must be out of sight during the school day, including recess and lunch. The mobile phone policy aims to promote a safe environment for both teachers and students and families are asked to work in partnership with the school to enforce the new rules. We understand there may be instances where you need to get an urgent message to your child, please

do so by contacting student services on 8182 0200. Students have already been very understanding of the mobile phone policy and it has been pleasing to see them engaging in conversations, rather than turning to their devices. We look forward to your support with this new policy.

Attendance Expectations

Attendance is compulsory for students who are at least 6 years old but not yet 16 years of age, this is known as being of compulsory school age. Every child of compulsory school age is required to be enrolled at a government or non-government school and is required to fully participate in the education program arranged and approved by the enrolling school.

At SHS, school starts at 8.40am & finishes at 3.10pm (Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday) and starts at 8.40am and finishes at 2.10pm (Wednesday). Students are to go straight to class if arriving between 8.40-9.00am, after this they are required to sign in at Student Services. A phone call or note from a parent should accompany the child when they are late.

If a child is absent from school on any particular day the **parent/** caregiver should contact the school before 9.00am to let the school know the reason for their absence.

A text message is sent between 9.30-10.00am for Junior and Middle school students & 11.00am-11.30am for senior students for those children who have been marked unexplained and no explanation of their absence/lateness has been documented on Daymap. Care teachers will follow up with families if absences/lateness remains unexplained.

Students who need to leave early must have preapproval organised by families (a note or phone call to the office). Staff will not phone home for students seeking permission to leave unless they are unwell.

Community Service

Community Service occurs on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays for 20 minutes, for students with off-task behaviours, lateness and other time-wasting issues in class. Students will be required to give back to the school community. Students will meet at the back of the Trade Centre at the start of lunch in Term 1 and must have their name marked off the roll. This has been introduced to support learning within classrooms. Students who do not attend community service, although present at school, will be placed on a full lunch detention (30 minutes) with leadership the next day. Community Service detentions will appear on DayMap and an email sent to care teachers informing them. Failure to attend again will result in the Senior Leader for Middle School becoming involved and further consequences will follow.

Task Completion Time (TCT)

When a task is not completed, a student will be enrolled in a scheduled learning area TCT. TCT sessions will run either during lunchtime or after school. This process is for all students in Years 7 – 12. Students will be supervised by curriculum coordinators, subject teachers, leadership and TRTs. Completion of tasks is not optional at Salisbury High School, it is essential.

They will unpack the data and take time to understand what it means for us in future meetings.

A sincere thank you to all of our staff and student volunteers who helped to make stall, and the wider event, a success. It's great to see you so passionate about our school!

Volunteering at Foodbank Warehouse

Students in the Senior Special Unit Class recently volunteered at the Foodbank SA Warehouse at Edwardstown.

They used public transport to travel to and from Foodbank. Students researched the times of trains and how long they would need for their journey. Some bought tickets on the trains, others already had fully charged multi-trip tickets for their journey.

Our students learnt about where to keep their personal belongings, toilet facilities and the lunch area at Foodbank. We had previously participated in an online Zoom induction with the Foodbank Education Officer. We wore high vis vests and learnt that Foodbank is a factory with machinery, so need to be careful, there is no running.

Students packaged apples into bags. The apples were seconds apples that had been donated to Foodbank. We needed to check the apples for bruising or damage that could cause the other apples to go off. Outdoor Education

Outdoor Education Update – Term 1

Term 1 has seen a busy start for the Outdoor Education Cohort, with Excursions and Camps already underway. Salisbury High school is now offering 2 different semester courses at Stage 1 and a full year Stage 2 course, with over 80 student enrolments in the subject across years 11 and 12.

Stage 1 Outdoor Education

All Stage 1 students had the opportunity to take part in 2 x 2-hour Indoor Rock-Climbing sessions at Vertical Reality Holden Hill. These sessions saw students push through mental and physical barriers in a safe environment, with many students overcoming their fears to make it to the top of the rock wall.

Students have used their experiences as the basis of their key assessment task for the term.





Stage 2 Outdoor Education

All Stage 2 students participated in a 3-day Aquatics Camp held at the Port Noarlunga Aquatic Centre. Students stayed at the Christies Beach Caravan Park, making the most of the amenities on their first camp. Students camped in tents and developed their Trangia cooking skills in preparation for future journeys to more remote areas.



Over the three days students participated in 4 surfing sessions, 1 snorkelling experience and were lucky enough to complete an extended paddle to the South reef, to explore rock-pools and the inter-tidal zone. The group was lucky to experience mild Autumn weather conditions with a small gentle swell, providing perfect conditions for beginner surfers.

Students demonstrated excellent teamwork, communication and positive attitudes throughout this camp, making it a positive experience for all involved. The stage 2 Cohort will now switch its focus to Bushwalking with day walks and camps taking place in term 2.

Wellbeing Update

Breakfast Club

Breakfast is considered an important meal because it breaks the overnight fasting period, replenishes the supply of glucose and provides other essential nutrients to keep energy levels up throughout the day. This helps students' ability to focus, learn and retain the new concepts they are learning about.

The Breakfast Program at Salisbury High School runs on Monday to Friday mornings from 8:00am - 8:35am. Our Breakfast Program is completely free and available to any student who would like something to eat in the morning. Toasted cheese sandwiches and milo are available. We are based outside the B building by the front gates during the warmer months and move inside to the B8 kitchen when things start to get cooler.

Thank you to Kickstart for Kids and Cos We Care who support our school breakfast program by providing us with the goods needed to run the program.

Mental Health

Mental health includes an individual's emotions, psychological and social wellbeing. Our mental health affects how we think, feel, and helps us determine how we handle stress, relate to others, and our ability to make certain choices. Over the past year with the impact of a worldwide pandemic and the risk of COVID19 we have seen an increase in mental health in young people in Australia.

From 2018, studies suggested that two in five young people from the ages of twelve to twenty five had a decline in their wellbeing and mental health. From surveys taken in 2020 and during the pandemic of last year, that number had increased to now one in two young people. With now 50 percent of young people impacted by a decline in mental health, studies have shown that this has been linked to COVID19 and how it has significantly impacted not only their lives but their families and friends. Families have endured extreme lockdown restrictions resulting in loss of work, school closure and many businesses and activities forcing to close. During this time, we have seen first hand the financial strain due to a loss of jobs and income, a loss of social and physical interaction. During this time, we still are seeing impacts in political stability and harm of climate change which has created an uncertainty of what is to occur in the future.

Young people and adolescents at this stage of their lives are trying to develop their own identity, intending to establish a career, travel and build a family of their own at some point in their lives. Over the past year we have seen a significant drop in young people being able to manage school, home, work and a loss of social skills and connection with others which is detrimental to a decline in mental health and wellbeing. We are seeing young people relying heavily on social media to stay connected with research suggesting that teens on average are using social media, anywhere from six to nine hours per day. With the increase of technology use and access to these platforms, teens are at higher risk of bullying and cyberbullying, social anxiety, depression.
