From the Principal



Dear Salisbury High School Community,

I hope this address finds you all in good health and high spirits as we enter the second term of the academic year. I am honoured to address you once again, highlighting the progress we have made and the initiatives we

are implementing to ensure the success and growth of our students.

Term 2 has commenced with a strong commitment to teaching and learning, placing great emphasis on improvement and personal development. We aim to minimise disruptions this term and shift our focus towards promoting regular attendance and timely completion of assignments.

In Term 1, we conducted NAPLAN testing for both our Year 7 and 9 students for the first time. The invaluable insights gained from these assessments will aid us in forming classes, implementing targeted interventions where necessary, and ensuring continuous growth in our students' learning journeys.

Throughout this term, our dedicated teachers will continue to prioritise intentional lesson planning to create opportunities for differentiated instruction within their classrooms. Guided by the data obtained from various testing processes, our educators will be able to effectively tailor their teaching methods and strategies.

Our Literacy Learning Intervention program is in full swing, with Year 7 and 8 students below the Standard for Expected Achievement (SEA) receiving two 50-minute sessions of intensive support each week. Additionally, our students with special needs are focusing on phonics, reading, and

numeracy during their compulsory sessions every morning. In every Year 7 and 8 English class, dedicated literacy blocks are provided to enhance students' reading and literacy skills.

To address numeracy concerns, we have also conducted tests for Year 7 and 8 students. These assessments will help us identify the necessary interventions required in this area. Our numeracy blocks will continue to be integrated into middle school Mathematics classes, as we are fully aware of the positive impact these interventions have on our students' progress. We strive for every student at SHS to become both literate and numerate, and we are proud to announce that over 50 students are receiving additional support on a weekly basis. Our numeracy School Services Officers (SSOs) are also providing assistance in junior classes as needed. Furthermore, they have established a dedicated numeracy room where they work closely with students and store relevant resources for both teachers and students to access.

Recently, we introduced a renewed Positive Behaviour for Learning approach, which prompted a review of our school values. Respect, kindness, and achievement have been identified as our core values, and we have successfully integrated a positive education focus into all care programs across Years 7 to 12. This comprehensive approach equips our students with valuable tools and strategies to think and act positively, taking into consideration mindset, achievement, self-esteem, and building strong relationships based on our school values. Both our staff and students have embraced this program, benefiting greatly from its implementation.

We are also committed to expanding the range of student-run clubs during lunchtimes. New additions this term include a meditation club and a cultural film club. Some students have also had the opportunity to participate in a DJing program, and we eagerly anticipate the growth and development of this initiative.

The student-led conferences provide an invaluable opportunity for parents to connect and engage in face-to-face meetings with care teachers, allowing their children to share their progress thus far. I urge all parents to schedule an appointment with their child's care teacher to ensure we can work collaboratively to

support your child's learning journey. We highly value the strong connections we have with our families. Please take the time to discuss your child's results with them and assist them in implementing strategies for task completion and academic improvement. Here are some tips to support your child's progress:

- Regularly check their homework on DayMap (if you require assistance, please book a computer lesson with our IT staff).
- Help them establish and maintain a routine that incorporates designated time for rest, relaxation, and homework.
- Encourage them to limit screen time and allocate sufficient time for reading.
- Take an active interest in reviewing their drafts.
- Celebrate their successes and provide encouragement.
- Emphasise the importance of consistent school attendance.
- Engage in discussions about their tasks.
- If possible, create a designated study zone at home.
- Foster a love for reading by engaging in shared reading activities.

Recently I had the privilege of joining the top ten academic students for lunch across all year levels. Their outstanding results continue to inspire us, and I am grateful for the opportunity to gain insights from our students' perspectives on various aspects of our school. Their feedback is invaluable and helps us drive positive change while affirming the strengths of our institution. I eagerly anticipate meeting with them again in Term 3.

Information received from David Lewis:

I retired with the rank of Professor Emeritus of Chemistry and Biochemistry after a 43-year career in higher education in the United States. In October 2022, I was chosen to deliver the Golden Jubilee Jubilee Address to the Adelaide University Class of 1972. During my career, I have published over 90 papers in refereed scientific journals, 5 refereed chapters in books (mainly published Proceedings of symposia where I was an invited speaker), 5 invited articles subject to editorial review only, 7 books with 3 more in press, and 12 columns in <i>Synform</i>, the open-access online supplement of the Georg Thieme <i>Synthesis</i> suite of journals. I received the 2018 HIST Award for Outstanding Achievement in the History of Chemistry, an international award supported and administered by the Division of the History of Chemistry of the American Chemical Society. I was named one of the Laureates of the Markovnikov Medal for Outstanding Achievement in Organic Chemistry in 2019. sesquicentennial of the publication of his eponymous Rule. Senior School News

As I type this letter, I am looking at the latest update of the SACE calendar and marvelling how fast the year is progressing. The vast majority of Year 12 are now approximately halfway through their studies for Stage 2. Unlike Year 11/Stage 1, work needs to be submitted, moderated and sent to SACE well before the end of Term 4, and the end of Term 3 is a realistic completion target for students to work towards.

If your child is currently working on their Stage 2 Research Project, they need to ensure they meet the deadlines set by their teachers. As above work needs to be marked, moderated and sent to SACE by the 22 nd of June if they are to be resulted in the June results window. If students don't submit and have not completed, they will be 'deleted' from the subject and required to complete the work in their own time. If they complete the work to the appropriate standard, only then they will be re-enrolled. If students do not complete Research Project they will not gain their SACE. Now is the time for action, as a school we have considerable supports in place, but students need to access these supports, attend all their RP lessons and actually produce work of an acceptable quality. Hopefully they will rise to the challenge.

In terms of Year 11, the school will be resulting the work completed during Semester 1 at the end of the term. Crucially, all students need to pass the requirements in terms of English and Maths at a C grade or above, if are to be on track in terms of 'completing' Stage 1. It's important that students do as well as possible across their subjects, otherwise options for continuing or selecting options in Year 12 might be severely limited. Year 12 at SHS is only a possibility for those that complete Stage 1 and engage with their education in a positive manner. There are lots of alternative options that can be considered, for those looking for something different for their future.

Lastly, on the matter of mobile devices, I'd personally like to thank the 90% of students who are 'doing the right thing' in terms of their phones. As ever, if you need to contact me about any matter, please don't hesitate to do so.

VET – Current Year 11 Students

Current VET students need to ensure they are attending their course every week. For many VET courses, students who have missed four or more days are considered high risk of not completing their certification. It is important that students

attend all sessions to remain up to date with their course work. As VET is competency based, it is not always possible to 'catch up' on missed work. If students are absent for too many sessions, they may not achieve their certificate. Please remember, if students are unable to attend, they need to have a valid reason and let their trainer and VET Coordinator know as soon as possible.

Students VET reports have been uploaded to their Daymap profile. Please ensure all students read through their reports and let their trainer or VET Coordinator know if they have any questions or concerns.

If students need additional support, please ensure they contact Mrs Daniels. There are many support services available upon request.

Several VET courses require students to complete structured work place learning. This is also a requirement for Certificate II construction students to enrol in a Stackable VET course in 2023.

2024 Year 12 VET courses

VET courses for year 12 students are limited.

Certificate II Construction students who have completed 10-days of structured workplace learning are eligible to apply for a 6-month Stackable VET course. Stackable VET courses aim to provide pre-vocational skills, work preparedness and the opportunity to try out different vocational areas. The two stackable VET courses offered at Salisbury High School include

- · Advanced Brick and Block Stackable
- Advanced Carpentry.

Cert II in Electrotechnology students can apply for the

 Year 12 Advanced skills Program in Advanced Electrotechnology: Refrigeration, Air-conditioning, Data and Voice communications.

Students achieving good grades with good attendance may be able to apply for the below courses. However, this must be negotiated with Mrs Daniels

- Individual support (ageing or disability)
- Health Services Assistance

- Information Technology
- Screen and media

There are a few additional VET courses year 12 students can apply for, but this must be negotiated with Mrs Daniels.



Students will have greater choices in their subjects in 2024, so it is very important that students choose wisely. We are looking forward to the rest of this term and thank families for their ongoing support.

Mobile Phone Policy



2023 School Year - Mobile Free Zone

In line with new government legislation, we are excited to become a mobile free zone from the beginning of the 2023 school year.

The new policy requires all public schools to implement a ban on the use of mobile phones and smartwatches, for all students, from the time they arrive at school to the end of the school day.

This means phones must be out of sight during the school day, including at recess and lunch. The mobile phone policy aims to promote a safe environment for both teachers and students, and families are asked to work in partnership with the school to enforce the new rules. Attendance Expectations

Attendance is compulsory for students who are at least 6 years old but not yet 16 years of age, this is known as being of compulsory school age. Every child of compulsory school age is required to be enrolled at a government or non-government school and is required to fully participate in the education program arranged and approved by the enrolling school.

At SHS, school starts at 8.40am and finishes at 3.10pm (Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday) and starts at 8.40am and finishes at 2.10pm (Wednesday)

. Students are to go straight to class if arriving between 8.40-9.00am, after this they are required to sign in at Student Services. A phone call or note from a parent should accompany the child when they are late.

If a child is absent from school on any particular day, the **parent/caregiver** should contact the school before 9.00am to let the school know the reason for their absence.

A text message is sent between 9.30-10.00am for Junior and Middle school students and 11.00am-11.30am for senior students for those children who have been marked unexplained and no explanation of their absence/lateness has been documented on Daymap. Care teachers will follow up with families if absences/lateness remains unexplained.

Students who need to leave early must have preapproval organised by families (a note or phone call to the office). Staff will not phone home for students seeking permission to leave unless they are unwell.

Community Service

Community Service occurs on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays for 20 minutes, for students with off-task behaviours, lateness and other time-wasting issues in class. Students will be required to give back to the school community. Students will meet at the back of the Trade Centre at the start of lunch in Term 1 and must have their name marked off the roll. This has been introduced to support learning within classrooms. Students who do not attend community service, although present at school, will be placed on a full lunch detention (30 minutes) with leadership the next day. Community Service detentions will appear on DayMap and an email sent to care teachers informing them. Failure to attend again will result in the Senior Leader for Middle School becoming involved and further consequences will follow.

Task Completion Time (TCT)

When a task is not completed, a student will be enrolled in a scheduled learning area TCT. TCT sessions will run during lunchtime. This process is for all students in Years 7-12. Students will be supervised by curriculum coordinators,

subject teachers, leadership and TRTs. Completion of tasks is not optional at Salisbury High School, it is essential.

STEM Update

STEM Scholarships

The next round of STEM scholarships will open in August/September 2023

Each year, the SA Department of Education offers high school students from under-represented groups (low socioeconomic status students and Aboriginal learners) the opportunity to receive scholarships of up to \$10,000 to pursue science and mathematics (STEM) subjects at SACE Stage 1 and 2 level. The funds can cover expenses such as the cost of tutors, laptops, excursions or any other strategy that directly supports the student to achieve in their chosen STEM subjects and pathways.

To apply for this scholarship, you must be:

- in year 10 in 2023
- · enrolled in a government school
- the holder of a school card (Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander students do not need to hold a school card)
- committed to completing at least 1 of the following STEM subjects at SACE stage 1 and stage 2 level; specialist mathematics, mathematical methods, digital technologies, chemistry or physics.
- achieved C minimum in year 10 maths and science
- willing to participate in mentoring programs and other activities that support STEM careers awareness.

Salisbury High School has had recipients in all rounds: 2018 Round 1 - 6 students, 2019 Round 2 - 7 students, 2020 Round 3 - 9 students, 2021 Round 4 - 5 students, 2022 Round 5 - 7 students and 2023 Round 6 - 7 students.

The Science Experience

The Science Experience is a fun 1, 3 or 4 days of science activities for Year 9 and 10 students in the 2023 program year.

The Science Experience is a three-day hands-on science activities program. The aim is to inform students of the importance of science and technology while stimulating and heightening their interests in a wide range of science disciplines and career opportunities, encouraging further studies in the sciences, while at the same time giving them a taste of university/tertiary life.

Each program is designed to provide students who have an interest in science with an opportunity to engage in a wide range of fascinating science activities under the guidance of scientists who love their work.

The program takes place in over thirty-five universities and tertiary institutions, within many different laboratories and lecture theatres. Participants perform experiments in the laboratories, meet and hear senior lecturers in the lecture theatres, attend site visits and walk around and experience what it is like to be on the campus of a university or tertiary institution. More than 84,000 students have taken this rare opportunity, up to date.

One aspect of the program often commented on by participants is the opportunity to meet and share ideas with students from different schools.



The important dates NRW includes are:


National Sorry Day, May 2, which is a day of remembering and paying respect to the First Nations peoples forcibly removed from their homes as part of the Stolen Generations.

time and the same laws applied to them as other Australians.

Anniversary of Torres Strait Islander Flag, May 29- being 31 years since the late Bernard Namok Senior from Thursday Island won the design competition for the flag and it was presented to the people. The green represents the mainland of Australia and Papua New Guinea and the blue is the water. The symbol is the Dhori and identifies Torres Strait Islanders. The five points of the star are our group the Eastern, Central, Western, Port Kennedy group and the many that made the mainland their home.

Mabo Day, June 2nd- recognises the anniversary of Eddie Koiki Mabo's work for Native Title and to overturn '*terra nullius*' in 1992. This gave his people back their land titles.

Northern Opportunities

Our Year 11 Northern Opportunities group had the unique opportunity to spend two days exploring tertiary study options and workplaces in Week 11 of Term 1. We spent Wednesday at the University of Adelaide, with a team from the Kain Foundation, and Friday at the Kain Lawyers offices and the Academy of Interactive Entertainment (AIE).

PrepMe Day 1: University of Adelaide

We began our crisp morning walking through the North Terrace campus on a tour of the main areas. Some of the fun facts we encountered were:

• Bonython Hall is where UoA students begin their journey with their induction... but it is also the place where graduations are held. This historically significant building was originally built to stop Pulteney Rd from continuing into the future, potentially splitting the university in two. The architects decided to build the floor on a slope, as they were quite conservative and didn't want people to dance!

- UoA has the largest 3D printer in the Southern Hemisphere... you can imagine what this machine is capable of printing.
- Their dental clinic is equip with a vending machine of prosthetic teeth, a much more ethical and easier way to gain practice then bringing in people every time!

Our first hands-on workshop focused on fueling and running **Hydrogen Cars**. Our students broke the session's standing record by several minutes! Jessica and Jessie quickly passed the 5 minute record to reach 6:28... but shortly after, Connor and Ebony smashed this to reach 11:56 by slightly adapting the method to generate more hydrogen in their cylinders. The opportunities created through this renewable source of energy is expected to create thousands of jobs within the next few years.



After a delicious bahn mi lunch, we then programmed **mini-Spherobots** through a maze. These small devices were programmed through a mobile phone app, connected through Bluetooth. We began by manually driving them, trying not to have them fall off the table. However, we soon turned to automated programs. Most of our groups successfully coded their robots to run independently through the maze – well done!

Lastly, our afternoon concluded with a **UniLife presentation**, explaining the opportunities and resources available to students should they choose to study here. The differences between high school and university life can be shocking for some students: less rules, a flexible timetable and more responsibilities... but these can also let students thrive, with more time for collaboration, a wider variety of subjects and study areas, and more people to connect with.

A key takeaway was that university was more 'self-directed'. Nobody will make you do work at university, but there are many who care about your wellbeing and a lot of academic support, provided you take initiative and reach out for it.

PrepMe Day 2: Kain Lawyers and AIE

Have you ever found yourself at a crossroads, unsure of which path to take? If so, you're not alone. During Friday's excursion, we had the pleasure of meeting a range of people from diverse career pathways for **speed networking**. Students posed questions to self-employed hair stylist Deb Groves of Substance Boutique; Philip, Carmine and Georgette from LAI Group who manufacture electrical switchboards; and semiretired teacher with a wealth of life and career experience, Victoria Newbold.

One familiar thread through all stories was that it is perfectly okay to not know what you're doing at first – in fact, it can be a stepping stone to something remarkable!

In the afternoon, we visited the esteemed Academy of Interaction Entertainment (AIE) which emphasised that unexpected opportunities may come from exploring paths off the beaten track. To our amazement, AIE students and graduates had contributed to renowned projects such as the Lego Movie and Avatar, which seemed like a huge accomplishment for somebody from Adelaide! However, we discovered that major developers and film corporations love to employ people from Adelaide! While the sun is shining in Adelaide, most of the US is preparing for bed. Our timezone allows for production to continue almost 24 hours, leading to quick turnarounds!

What's clear is life is a continuous journey of growth and discovery. We look forward to continuing on this journey with our Northern Opportunities students for the remaining 3 PrepMe excursion days in Term 3. Thank you to the Kain Foundation for their dedication to supporting our students to thrive!

Humanities and English Update

On Thursday May 4th, the Year 10 English & History class attended an excursion to the Adelaide Holocaust Museum and Steiner Education Centre as part of their unit on World War II. Students had the opportunity to participate in a guided tour of the Museum, led by two of the Steiner Education Centre's Educational Coordinators. During these sessions, students participated in two facilitated inquiry tasks. Students looked at artefacts related to the Holocaust and analysed the relevance of key themes such as Anti-Semitism, Pre-war Jewish Life, Anti-Jewish legislation, The Final Solution, the Resistance, and the role of Perpetrators/Bystanders. Additionally, students investigated the Holocaust through the life stories of six survivors that settled in South Australia following the war, whose stories are told throughout the exhibition.



The day was an enjoyable experience for all students involved and expanded their knowledge of World War II and the Holocaust.

What the students had to say:

"The excursion to the Holocaust Museum and War Memorial was beneficial as it allowed us to get first hand learning by analysing artefacts and significant objects."



Our experienced teachers are dedicated to teaching your child practical skills that will serve them well throughout their lives. From learning how to plan healthy meals and making delicious dishes, to developing budgeting and discerning food choices, our program offers a wealth of knowledge that helps young people succeed in the future, with design thinking and critical and creative thinking skills and dispositions. In Food Technology, we're shaping tomorrow's leaders one skill at a time!

Culinary techniques

- Baking: A common technique used for cakes, cookies, pies, and other baked desserts. Baking uses dry heat to cook and brown the dessert.
- Boiling: Used to cook homemade paste [Year 10 & 11], boiling involves heating a liquid until it reaches a high temperature.

- Whipping: Whipping incorporates air into a mixture, such as whipped cream or meringue, to give it a light and fluffy texture. In year 10 Food Innovation they undertake a pavlova challenge and make traditional pavlovas and vegan pavlovas using aquafaba [chickpea juice]
- Tempering: This technique involves slowly heating and cooling chocolate to achieve a smooth and glossy texture. Years 10-12 love working with chocolate! And love eating it too!
- Pan Frying: Used for making butter chicken in Year 11
 Food Innovation from scratch, including 11 different spices.
- Caramelizing: This technique involves heating sugar or butter until it melts and turns brown, giving desserts or butter-based dishes a sweet and nutty flavor.
- Steaming: Used for puddings and cakes, steaming involves cooking the dessert in a moist environment, such as a steamer or a water bath. Used in year 11
 Food Innovation to cook handmade dumplings for the Food Truck practical.
- Blending: Used to create smooth purees or to incorporate ingredients like beetroot puree into beetroot vegan brownies in the Year 9 Food and Nutrition course.
- Rolling: Used for desserts like truffles or bliss balls, rolling involves forming the dessert into a small ball or cylinder shape. Scales are used to ensure uniform size and shape, at an industry standard [to be sold in a café] by the Year 8 Food and Nutrition students.
- Piping: Used for decorating cakes or cupcakes, piping involves using a piping bag to apply frosting or other decorative elements. Piping techniques can be used in savoury items too, like piped baked mashed potato as a garnish.
- Braising: This technique involves cooking food in a small amount of liquid, such as stock or juice, until it becomes tender and flavorful. Used in year 9 in the Sweet Potato & Beef Burgandy practical.
- Infusing: This technique involves adding flavors to food items and accompaniments by steeping ingredients like essences or herbs in a liquid. Year 11 Food Innovation made herb infused butter for Open Night...it was a hit!

Culinary skills

- Measuring: Precise measurement of ingredients is crucial for successful recipe outcomes. Across ALL year levels in every practical lesson. The Year 7 Food & Nutrition students use digital scales to measure portions for their Bliss Balls to ensure industry standard, uniform size & shape
- Mixing: Combining ingredients together to form a cohesive batter or dough. Used across all year levels during practical lessons.
- Creaming: A technique used in baking, sugar and butter are beaten together until light and fluffy. Year 8 Food & Nutrition making cupcakes & icing.
- Folding: Gently incorporating a light ingredient, such as whipped cream or beaten egg whites, into a heavier mixture. Year 9 Food & Nutrition folding caster sugar into egg whites to make meringues
- Melting: Using gentle heat to melt ingredients like chocolate or butter. Melting butter to make Zucchini and dark chocolate brownies with year 9 Food and Nutrition
- Sifting: Passing dry ingredients through a sieve to remove lumps and create a fine texture. To make a signature dessert, love heart shaped Red Velvet Cakes with dark chocolate truffles and pink chocolate garnish for Year 12 food & Hospitality
- Zesting: Grating the outer layer of citrus fruits to add flavor to desserts. Year 7 Food & Nutrition, zesting lemons for homemade Houmas dip
- Chopping: Cutting ingredients into small, uniform pieces for even cooking and texture. ALL year levels in every practical lesson [Julienne, Chiffonade, Brunoix, Jardineire, Batons]
- Blending: Mixing ingredients together using a blender or food processor. Year 9 Food & Nutrition, blending pumpkin for healthy spiced pumpkin muffins
- Kneading: Working dough by hand to develop gluten and create a smooth texture. Year 9 & 10 Food & Nutrition making homemade pasta & Year 8 Food & Nutrition making homemade bread.
- Decorating: Using icing, frosting, or other decorative elements to make desserts look visually appealing.
 SACE students making sauces, ganache, toffee chards, chocolate filigree, sugar work, butter cream and royal icing.
- Garnishing: Adding a final touch to desserts with fresh fruit, nuts, or herbs with Year 9 food and Nutrition Clean Eating Dessert individual summative practical

- Caramelizing: Heating sugar until it melts and turns brown, giving desserts a sweet and nutty flavor. Year 10 food innovation, caramelizing apples for homemade apple pie jam
- Tempering: Slowly heating and cooling chocolate to achieve a smooth and glossy texture. Year 10 Food and Nutrition, chocolate work
- Plating: Arranging desserts on a plate or platter in an attractive and appealing manner.



Check-ups are completely free with no out of pocket expense and are covered by the Child Dental Benefits Schedule. We would encourage all students to have a check-up if they haven't had one in the last 12 months.

Breakfast Club

Breakfast is considered an important meal because it breaks the overnight fasting period, replenishes the supply of glucose and provides other essential nutrients to keep energy levels up throughout the day. This helps students' ability to focus, learn and retain the new concepts they are learning about. The Breakfast Program at Salisbury High School runs on Monday to Friday mornings from 8:00am - 8:35am. Our Breakfast Program is completely free and available to any student who would like something to eat in the morning. Toasted cheese sandwiches and milo are available. We are based outside the B building by the front gates during the warmer months and move inside to the B8 kitchen when things start to get cooler.

Thank you to Kickstart for Kids and Cos We Care who support our school breakfast program by providing us with the goods needed to run the program.

Mental Health

Mental health includes an individual's emotions, psychological and social wellbeing. Our mental health affects how we think, feel, and helps us determine how we handle stress, relate to others, and our ability to make certain choices. Over the past year with the impact of a worldwide pandemic and the risk of COVID19 we have seen an increase in mental health in young people in Australia.

From 2018, studies suggested that two in five young people from the ages of twelve to twenty five had a decline in their wellbeing and mental health. From surveys taken in 2020 and during the pandemic of last year, that number had increased to now one in two young people. With now 50 percent of young people impacted by a decline in mental health, studies have shown that this has been linked to COVID19 and how it has significantly impacted not only their lives but their families and friends. Families have endured extreme lockdown restrictions resulting in loss of work, school closure and many businesses and activities forcing to close. During this time, we have seen first hand the financial strain due to a loss of jobs and income, a loss of social and physical interaction. During this time, we still are seeing impacts in political stability and harm of climate change which has created an uncertainty of what is to occur in the future.

Young people and adolescents at this stage of their lives are trying to develop their own identity, intending to establish a career, travel and build a family of their own at some point in their lives. Over the past year we have seen a significant drop in young people being able to manage school, home, work and a loss of social skills and connection with others which is detrimental to a decline in mental health and wellbeing.

We are seeing young people relying heavily on social media to stay connected with research suggesting that teens on average are using social media, anywhere from six to nine hours per day. With the increase of technology use and access to these platforms, teens are at higher risk of bullying and cyberbullying, social anxiety, depression.


