### From the Principal



Term 2 has been very busy! Salisbury High School (SHS) staff are currently trialling the Dibells method of testing students for reading. The testing will be conducted for students in Years 7-10 classes during weeks 7 and 8. The aim of this trial is to determine if the Dibells method provides improved testing and greater benefits in the

classroom. The results of this trial will help shape future reading assessments at the school.

In addition to the reading trial, LEAP levelling is underway for all students with English as an additional language at SHS. This process plays a significant role in determining the school's funding for 2024 for these students. The staff are working diligently to ensure accurate levelling assessments occur.

Furthermore, the teachers at SHS have integrated the use of text type scaffolds into their teaching practices. This integration was facilitated by Joseph Pipicella, who led the implementation process. The teachers have become adept at incorporating these scaffolds to support reading comprehension and writing skills across various subject areas.

The school's continued focus on numeracy aims to improve both teachers' and students' dispositions towards mathematics. The goal is to promote the significance of numeracy across all curriculum areas, making it a collective responsibility. A template has been provided to all learning areas to map where numeracy and mathematics concepts appear throughout each subject. The long-term objective is to identify specific mathematical concepts and skills to focus on each term for years 7-10. Visual displays showcasing the application of mathematics outside the math classroom are also planned. Additionally, the maths team intends to develop a Year 11 Numeracy LAP (Learning and Assessment Plan) that aligns with students' learning needs.

Problem-solving is emphasized in all math classes on a weekly basis, ensuring students have regular opportunities to develop their problem-solving skills.

Numeracy tests are currently being conducted with Year 8 students to determine interventions that are needed to be put in place. Numeracy blocks are being held in the double lessons of Maths classes for all Year 8 and 9 students. Numeracy improvement is now part of our site improvement plan.

Snapshots were released in Week 5 and the focus on improvement is ongoing. Reports are now released online via DayMap. Please discuss your child's results with them and help them put strategies in place to ensure task completion and improvement. Thank you also to the many parents who engaged in the recent phone/zoom interviews during the last week of school. This change in the student led conferences was a direct result of the success of this format during covid times. Conducting the interviews this way meant that parents and staff avoided the arctic conditions whist still connecting with teachers to discuss their child's progress. We will revert back to the face-to-face interviews next term.

Reconciliation Week was celebrated at our school recently with outstanding success. Many activities were held including, clay art, Sista Gurlz crafts, face painting and yarning circle, tasting of hunting meats, the amazing race by the student action teams and Nunga games in the gym. In addition, the Sista Gurlz, SAASTA and Clontarf visited a local primary school to run cultural activities for their Reconciliation week. The respect and participation by the whole school was impressive.

Refugee Week also had a number of significant events to share with all our students to also raise cultural awareness. These included mandala chalk paintings, staff versus students futsal games, henna painting, cooking, dancing, a fashion parade, drumming, a halal BBQ and much more. The participation was extensive. Many thanks to all the staff and students involved especially Mr Pipicella who led the organisation of the many activities. This week embraced the richness of our school community. Salisbury High School is now represented by over 25 different cultural groups.



Once again Salisbury High School students participated in the NASSSA Maths Olympics. Congratulations to all students involved. They were excellent ambassadors for our school.

### **Senior School News**

The completion of Semester 1 for Year 11 students and teachers is a stressful time with due dates for both parties. By the time you read this the completion of Sage 1 Results have been sent off to SACE as well as the Research Project external investigations for this year's Year 12 cohort. Attendance this term has dipped with the colder weather, however the workload has not. Consistent attendance has shown to be the key determining factor that breeds success throughout life.

With our current focus on Semester 2, students will need to show up to aim for the best grades possible. Our teaching staff commit to providing opportunities for all students at Salisbury High School to help reach their highest academic potential. It is crucial that students are present nearly every single lesson if they are able to unlock the potential they have hidden away. A portion of our Year 11 cohort will be completing their first Stage 2 subject this year – Research Project. It is imperative for students to be actively present it all classes to access and utilise the support given.

#### Year 11 into 12 VET courses

To apply for a VET course, students need to:

#### Term 2

- Collect and record evidence of industry immersion: This can include work experience, research into theirchosen career, notes from the 'Hear from the Trainer' sessions (recordings available), PLP work, White Card training, First Aid Training, attending industry immersion excursions, etc. Students are then required to complete a document reflecting on what they have learnt. Salisbury High School has been providing these opportunities throughout the year.
- 2. Watch the VET course enrolment video
- 3. Apply for a USI
- Supply written/photographic evidence of industry immersion:
- 5. Select a VET course during subject selections
- Attendan interview with Mrs Daniels to determine the suitability of the course - i.e. career pathway, logistics, grades, attendance, etc.

#### 2024 Year 12 VET courses

### VET courses for year 12 students are limited.

**Certificate II Construction students** who have completed 10-days of structured workplace learning are eligible to apply for a 6-month Stackable VET course. Stackable VET courses aim to provide pre-vocational skills, work preparedness and the opportunity to try out different vocational areas. The two stackable VET courses offered at Salisbury High School include

- Advanced Brick and Block Stackable
- Advanced Carpentry.

Cert II in Electrotechnology students can apply for the

 year 12 Advanced skills Program in Advanced Electrotechnology: Refrigeration, Air-conditioning, Data and Voice communications.

Students achieving good grades with good attendance may be able to apply for the below courses. However, this must be negotiated with Mrs Daniels

- Individual support (ageing or disability)
- Health Services Assistance
- Information Technology
- Screen and media

#### VET Industry Immersion Programs

This term, the Northern Adelaide Secondary Schools Alliance (NASSA) has been running Immersion Activities for year 10 students at participating schools in the Northern Suburbs. These immersion activities are often a prerequisite for Vocational Education and Training (VET) courses. These programs are run so that students can get a better understanding of the career pathway and the course they are interested in applying for. Students require evidence of industry immersion to complete a formal Expression of Interest.

Salisbury High School has hosted five Industry Immersion sessions this term. These include Try a Trade Bricklaying, Try a Trade Carpentry / plastering, Women in Trade, and two white card sessions. Students enjoyed this experience and said that this experience confirmed their interested in their chosen VET courses / potential career pathways.

#### Junior School News (Year 7 & 8)

As we end Term 2, our years 7 and 8s are starting to focus on subject counselling. This is an exciting and important time for all students, as they get to have a choice in some of the subjects they will be learning in 2024. Year 7s are able to choose 5 elective term long subjects - 2 from arts, 1 design tech, 2 free choice from anything. While Year 8 students will be able to choose 4 semesters of elective subjects for 2023. (2 subjects in semester 1 and 2 subjects in semester 2). It is so important that during this process students think carefully about their interests and strengths to enable them to pick the subjects that they enjoy and are interested in, rather than simply following their friends. Students finally get to have a bit more choice in their schooling options, and it's so important that they explore them carefully to make the choices that suit them best.

We look forward to connecting with you all at the Student Led Conferences on Wednesday, 5th July. Please ensure you have booked a time to meet with your child's Care Teacher. #### **Mobile Phone Policy**



#### 2023 School Year - Mobile Free Zone

In line with new government legislation, we are excited to become a mobile free zone from the beginning of the 2023 school year.

The new policy requires all public schools to implement a ban on the use of mobile phones and smartwatches, for all students, from the time they arrive at school to the end of the school day.

This means phones must be out of sight during the school day, including at recess and lunch. #### Attendance Expectations

Attendance is compulsory for students who are at least 6 years old but not yet 16 years of age, this is known as being of compulsory school age. Every child of compulsory school age is required to be enrolled at a government or non-government school and is required to fully participate in the education program arranged and approved by the enrolling school.

At SHS, school starts at 8.40am and finishes at 3.10pm (Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday) and starts at 8.40am and finishes at 2.10pm (Wednesday). Students are to go straight to class if arriving between 8.40-9.00am, after this they are required to sign in at Student Services. A phone call or note from a parent should accompany the child when they are late.

If a child is absent from school on any particular day, the **parent/caregiver** should contact the school before 9.00am to let the school know the reason for their absence.

A text message is sent between 9.30-10.00am for Junior and Middle school students and 11.00am-11.30am for senior students for those children who have been marked unexplained and no explanation of their absence/lateness has been documented on Daymap. Care teachers will follow up with families if absences/lateness remains unexplained.

Students who need to leave early must have preapproval organised by families (a note or phone call to the office). Staff will not phone home for students seeking permission to leave unless they are unwell. Please look at the below link for more info:

#### **Community Service**

Community Service occurs on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays for 20 minutes, for students with off-task behaviours, lateness and other time-wasting issues in class. Students will be required to give back to the school community. Students will meet at the back of the Trade Centre at the start of lunch in Term 1 and must have their name marked off the roll. This has been introduced to support learning within classrooms. Students who do not attend community service, although present at school, will be placed on a full lunch detention (30 minutes) with leadership the next day. Community Service detentions will appear on DayMap and an email sent to care teachers informing them. Failure to attend again will result in the Senior Leader for Middle School becoming involved and further consequences will follow.

#### Task Completion Time (TCT)

When a task is not completed, a student will be enrolled in a scheduled learning area TCT. TCT sessions will run during lunchtime. This process is for all students in Years 7 - 12. Students will be supervised by curriculum coordinators, subject teachers, leadership and TRTs. Completion of tasks is not optional at Salisbury High School, it is essential.

As PLP coordinator, it is with excitement that I am sharing a new development with you.


Following the *SACE Stage 2 Review* in 2018, it was evident curriculum and assessment required active reshaping to ensure every student thrives. This included revitalising the Personal Learning Plan (PLP) and Research Project (RP). In response to successful pilot programs having occurred in 2022 and 2023, PLP is being rebranded as Exploring Identities and Futures and will be implemented across South Australian schools as of next year.

# Introducing the Stage 1 Exploring Identities and Futures subject


In 2024, Salisbury High school will introduce the new SACE flagship subject, Exploring Identities and Futures. Exploring Identities and Futures gives students the opportunity to extend their thinking beyond what they want to do, to also consider who they want to be in the future. This subject will replace the current Stage 1 compulsory subject PLP.

Schools, teachers and students who experienced EIF during its creation across 2022 and 2023, have told us:

- there were more opportunities to deeply explore the things that matter to them
- students' learning shifted from passive to active
- relationships between students and teachers strengthened
- the learning was deeper, more authentic, and better reflected the volume of work required for a 10-credit subject
- they were able to transfer learning to other subjects
- they were challenged to take control of their learning

# The next round of STEM scholarships will open in August/September 2023

Each year the SA Department of Education offers high school students from under-represented groups (low socioeconomic status students and Aboriginal learners) the opportunity to receive scholarships of up to \$10,000 to pursue science and mathematics (STEM) subjects at SACE Stage 1 and 2 level. The funds can cover expenses such as the cost of tutors, laptops, excursions or any other strategy that directly supports the student to achieve in their chosen STEM subjects and pathways.

To apply for this scholarship, you must be:

- in year 10 in 2023
- enrolled in a government school

- the holder of a school card (Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander students do not need to hold a school card)
- committed to completing at least 1 of the following STEM subjects at SACE stage 1 and stage 2 level; specialist mathematics, mathematical methods, digital technologies, chemistry or physics.
- achieved C minimum in year 10 maths and science
- willing to participate in mentoring programs and other activities that support STEM careers awareness.

Salisbury High School has had recipients in all rounds: 2018 Round 1 - 6 students, 2019 Round 2 - 7 students, 2020 Round 3 - 9 students, 2021 Round 4 - 5 students, 2022 Round 5 - 7 students and 2023 Round 6 - 7 students.

#### The Science Experience is a fun 1, 3 or 4 days of science activities for Year 9 and 10 students in 2023 program year.

Each program is designed to provide students who have an interest in science with an opportunity to engage in a wide range of fascinating science activities under the guidance of scientists who love their work.

The program takes place in over thirty-five universities and tertiary institutions, within many different laboratories and lecture theatres. Participants perform experiments in the laboratories, meet and hear senior lecturers in the lecture theatres, attend site visits and walk around and experience what it is like to be on the campus of a university or tertiary institution. More than 84,000 students have taken this rare opportunity, up to date.

The program also provides information about further studies in science, technology and engineering. It highlights the wide range of careers that allow students to pursue their interest and abilities in the sciences.

One aspect of the program often commented on by participants is the opportunity to meet and share ideas with students from different schools.

### **Literacy Intervention**

#### **Levelled Literacy Intervention**

Throughout Semester 1, we have approximately 80 students participating in our Levelled Literacy Intervention program here at SHS. LLI lessons re-commenced for Term 2, on Monday (Week 1). We have approximately 40 students in Year 7 and 40 students in Year 8 partaking in this program. Students attend two 45-minute lessons per week, with a trained LLI Facilitator. The students have engaged really well so far through Semester 1 and will continue to progress in developing their skills further, through additional support in Semester 2.

#### What is LLI?

Levelled Literacy Intervention (LLI) is an intensive, smallgroup, supplementary literacy intervention for students who find reading and writing difficult. Students currently working below the SA Department of Education's Standard of Educations Achievement (SEA) will participate in the program. The goal of LLI is to lift the literacy achievement of students who are not achieving grade-level expectations in reading.

The majority of LLI lessons take place at 9.30am and 11.40am daily, with some additional alternative start times. This has minimised the impact across the board, for students and staff involved in the program. LLI continues to run in our Library (Resource Centre), acting as a perfect space to support our students.

The following SSO's oversee the LLI program; Helen Barron, Cate Bell, James Love and Mark Karvelis.

If you would like any further information about the program or your child's reading, please do not hesitate to contact the school. Students partaking in the LLI program have their lessons displayed on Daymap, ensuring that lesson time can be checked easily from school and at home.

We are excited about supporting our students again in Term 3.

### PHONICS SERIES

Phonics lessons have been up and running in Semester 1, for approximately 15

students across Year 7 and 8.

The aim of Phonics is to support students in understanding how letters are linked to sounds (phonemes) to form lettersound correspondences and spelling patterns and to help them learn apply this knowledge in their reading. A sound Phonics knowledge is required to be a successful reader. The students involved in this intervention currently complete some Phonics based learning in class, but they will also attend some small group learning sessions to provide more intensive support. Mark Karvelis is the SSO whom is currently supporting students with Phonics in 2023.

The 2023 timetable format consists of students attending 3 x 20 minute sessions spread out across the week. This is designed to keep the sessions to the point and more regular as opposed to our previous time format, we hope to grow further consistency through routine. Phonics continues to run in our Library (Resource Centre), acting as a perfect space to support our students in their personal growth.

#### Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills

Salisbury High School are in the process of transitioning from Running Record reading level assessments, to Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills (DIBELS) assessments. DIBELS is a series of short tests (1 - 3)minutes), that assess Year 7 and 8 students, identifying student reading levels and deficiencies. It is a set of procedures and measures for assessing the acquisition of a set of Year 7 - 8 literacy skills, such as phonemic awareness, alphabetic principle, accuracy, fluency, and comprehension.

#### **Reading Levels**

SHS currently refer to student reading levels a great deal, ensuring that students receive the most appropriate level of support possible. All of our Year 7, 8, 9 and 10 students have their most recent Reading Level information displayed on their Daymap profiles.

Reading Levels are determined from their most recent Running Records complete. This information provides insight on students student reading levels and how best to support our students further. The information that will display on Daymap includes each students;

- Reading Level
- Accuracy
- Fluency
- Comprehension
- Reading Age

This information will update again on Daymap after the next Reading Level assessment has been complete. If you would like any further information about the program or your child's reading, please do not hesitate to contact the school.

#### World Environment Day 2023 – June 5

As a contribution to World Environment Day 2023,

students from our Senior Unit Class at Salisbury High School continued recycling plastic containers and, this year, have planted 50 groundcovers, grasses and low shrubs in our bush garden. They also viewed the recently released film 'Blue Back' and discussed environmental issues related to this film as part of World Ocean Day that was on June the 8<sup>th</sup>. Did you know that the theme for World Environment Day 2023 was #BeatPlasticPolution? This is a reminder to all of us that we have a responsibility to reduce the amount of plastic that we consume. Every year, over 400 million ton of plastic waste is produced worldwide. Only 10% of this waste ends up being recycled, we have a long way to go in ensuring that we reduce our dependence on plastics. Every one of us can do our own bit through packing food into containers rather than using disposable plastic film and plastic bags. On Friday the 9<sup>th</sup> of June students from the Senior Unit Class prepared planting holes and planted locally grown indigenous plants that were provided through a donation from The City of Salisbury. The plants had been propagated using locally sourced seed and plant material by Provenance Indigenous Plants, a nursery based at Sandy Crescent at Salisbury Park. Students planted a range of local grasses including tussock grass, lomandra, spear grass and a native lemon grass. We planted groundcovers including hardenbergia, kennedia that has a pretty red flower and a native clematis. Low growing shrubs that were planted included melaleuca, leptospermum and colothamnus. All of these plants will add to the biodiversity of the bush garden where students have previously propagated of hakea, planted many several species different groundcovers and other indigenous plants. The project really has started from the ground up. Students have been working on building up the health of the soil between the M Building and Farley Grove for several years through chipping out weed plants and spreading chipped bark and tree mulch thickly across the area. The result has been the creation of soil that is now much healthier than when the project first began in 2019 with many truck loads of mulch being dropped into the area. Since then the mulch has begun to break down and establish fungal communities where we can now observe mycelium networks and fungal growths that have grown from the decaying mulch and in turn feeding the soil and the plants. This is encouraging small insects to colonise the area and in turn we hope to see the return of small birds and marsupials to the area. Congratulations to all the students who have been involved in this project over a number of years. It should be

satisfying to see the results of this project develop in the next few years.

Working with children and young people is my passion and I have had the privilege to work with many youths

#### **Oasis Program**

Across term 2, a small group of year 8 students have had the opportunity to participate in the *Oasis Program* with Pastoral Care Worker, Sophie.

The *Oasis Program* is a resource designed to equip young people to embrace and learn more about themselves. This program seeks to enhance social and emotional wellbeing, giving students the opportunity to foster a healthy connection with themselves and with others. #### **Breakfast Club**

Breakfast is considered an important meal because it breaks the overnight fasting period, replenishes the supply of glucose and provides other essential nutrients to keep energy levels up throughout the day. This helps students' ability to focus, learn and retain the new concepts they are learning about.

The Breakfast Program at Salisbury High School runs on Monday to Friday mornings from 8:00am - 8:35am. Our Breakfast Program is completely free and available to any student who would like something to eat in the morning. Toasted cheese sandwiches and milo are available. We are based outside the B building by the front gates during the warmer months and move inside to the B8 kitchen when things start to get cooler.

Thank you to Kickstart for Kids and Cos We Care who support our school breakfast program by providing us with the goods needed to run the program.

#### **Mental Health**

Mental health includes an individual's emotions, psychological and social wellbeing. Our mental health affects how we think, feel, and helps us determine how we handle stress, relate to others, and our ability to make certain choices. Over the past year with the impact of a worldwide pandemic and the risk of COVID19 we have seen an increase in mental health in young people in Australia.

From 2018, studies suggested that two in five young people from the ages of twelve to twenty five had a decline in their wellbeing and mental health. From surveys taken in 2020 and during the pandemic of last year, that number had increased to now one in two young people. With now 50 percent of young people impacted by a decline in mental health, studies have shown that this has been linked to COVID19 and how it has significantly impacted not only their lives but their families and friends. Families have endured extreme lockdown restrictions resulting in loss of work, school closure and many businesses and activities forcing to close. During this time, we have seen first hand the financial strain due to a loss of jobs and income, a loss of social and physical interaction. During this time, we still are seeing impacts in political stability and harm of climate change which has created an uncertainty of what is to occur in the future.

Young people and adolescents at this stage of their lives are trying to develop their own identity, intending to establish a career, travel and build a family of their own at some point in their lives. Over the past year we have seen a significant drop in young people being able to manage school, home, work and a loss of social skills and connection with others which is detrimental to a decline in mental health and wellbeing. We are seeing young people relying heavily on social media to stay connected with research suggesting that teens on average are using social media, anywhere from six to nine hours per day. With the increase of technology use and access to these platforms, teens are at higher risk of bullying and cyberbullying, social anxiety, depression.
