From the Principal

I would like to wish them the very best as they partake in the final events for our Year 12 students, namely Speech Day and the formal. I would also like to acknowledge the exceptionally hard work of our year 12 teachers, who provided very proactive support for all of their students. I also acknowledge the challenges and stresses our families face, as they too support their children.

Thank you to all the families who attended Term 3 student led conferences. Our connection with you is critical in supporting your children. Our partnership with families is highly valued and necessary in supporting all students on their educational journey.

We hope to see as many of you there as possible.



Thank you to the Syrian families who recently attended a family night facilitated by Relationships SA. The opportunity to discuss their family and children's needs was invaluable. Together we can support each other as we better understand how this can occur.

Best of luck to all students who were selected for the Strive Camp. The quality and quantity of applicants was extremely high. Congratulations to all the students who attended interviews and won places for this year's camp. This year the camp will be held at Port Vincent.

I do want to acknowledge the large number of our students who have been applying and winning scholarships. Many students have already won scholarships to support them with their schooling in the future. Teachers have worked hard to support students through this process and it is pleasing to see students so motivated in maximising these opportunities. We are still awaiting the outcome for a large number of scholarships. If any exiting Year 12 students would like to donate their uniforms back to the school, we would be most appreciative. We encourage recycling and playing it forward. Donating your old uniforms is a perfect way to do both. Please leave them at the front office so that other students can be supported when there is a need. Thank you in advance.

It is with much excitement that I can share our most recent purchase. The school now owns a new catering van which will be used by the school onsite as much as possible. It will promote entrepreneurial activities for a variety of different groups including Special Education, Thrive group, hospitality students and much more. The students are really excited and the possibilities are endless.



Other good news regarding facilities is that our COLA (covered outdoor learning area) which will be built over the outdoor courts is at the final stages of the tender process. We are eagerly awaiting the announcement of the start date of the build. We continue to upgrade our school. New carpets, improved office spaces and more modern projectors have been upgraded during the last holidays. We take great pride in our school and are fortunate to have excellent groundsmen who ensure it is the best it can be, every day.

On Tuesday, 12th November, Salisbury High School was honoured to host a visit from CE Martin Westwell.

Although the visit was brief, Martin met with a small group of the executive team who shared insights about the school's context, current successes, priorities, and challenges. Martin also had the opportunity to visit a maths classroom, where he observed a numeracy block in action and interacted with students from our Thrive Program. This program is an on-site tailored learning initiative that we aim to further develop in 2025.

Martin engaged with a number of students, asking questions to better understand their experiences and needs. Sylvia advocated for the staff and students in the north, highlighting the complexities of our schooling environments, the workload, staffing concerns and the emotional demands.

We discussed our commitment to providing tailored learning and the inadequacies of our current facilities in meeting program delivery requirements. Martin was also given a tour of the school, during which we discussed our journey with the DfE strategy and the development of our site learning plan. While the future steps are uncertain, we feel privileged to have had the opportunity to share our story.



Lastly, in week 9 of this term we will be having 2 student free days to provide time for staff to prepare for the 2025 school year. We have purposefully waited until the end of the year for this planning to occur, to minimise disruption to classes. The opportunity for staff to plan, collaborate and upskill is vital for strong beginnings in 2025. A number of the staff new to Salisbury High School in 2025 will also be in attendance.

The last 4 weeks will be action packed as the school year comes to a close. Keep up to date with events

and attend as many as you can. We love seeing parents at our school.

VET News

Apprenticeship Networking Event

Salisbury High School hosted its first-ever Apprenticeship Networking Event on November 6th. We had an amazing turnout, with over 50 NASSSA students in attendance and 20 different employers present! The event was a great success, as it allowed students to connect with local employers, learn about various career pathways, and establish valuable connections for future job opportunities.

During the event, students met representatives from different construction industries to discuss full-time and school-based apprenticeship opportunities while gaining insights into available pathways and work experience. Many students came prepared with their resumes and profiles, eager to explore local options. Since the event, several students have already secured interviews, and some are in the process of signing up for an apprenticeship.

Overall, the Apprenticeship Networking Day was an invaluable experience, providing students with new contacts and potential career opportunities. We hope to organise more events like this in the future!



Year 10 - Intro to Construction VET Course

For the past 10 weeks, 12 Year 10 students at Salisbury High School have been participating in the Intro to Construction, Plumbing, and Roof Plumbing VET course, gaining valuable hands-on experience and skills. This introductory course provided students with three units of competency, contributing to their future VET studies or potential apprenticeships. All 12 students successfully completed the course, demonstrating great enthusiasm, commitment, and participation. We are incredibly proud of their achievements and look forward to seeing where these skills take them in their future careers.

VET Applications for 2025

Over 100 students from Salisbury High School have applied to study a VET course in 2025. The VET Readiness Orientation (VETRO) testing for all Flexible Industry Pathway (FIP) courses will be completed by the end of week five in term four, and it typically takes a few weeks to process the results.

It is important to note that all Registered Training Organizations (RTOs) offering courses funded by the Department for Innovation and Skills participate in the VETRO process. This process ensures that students are enrolling in a course that match their interests and abilities, allowing for the planning of appropriate personal and learning support to enhance the chances of successful course completion.

All students, whether they have successfully passed the VETRO test and been accepted into a course or not, can expect to receive a notification in the form of a letter or email from the host school. This communication will typically be sent either towards the end of term four or early 2025 to inform them of their course status.

Connor Kearney, a rising star in Brazilian Jiujitsu, has made waves in both the youth and professional circuits. His journey began with an impressive showing at the prestigious King of the Youth Championship, propelling him to the National Level under the Fusion banner.

Connor's talents were further recognised when he was invited to compete in the professional division at a Fusion event in Melbourne, a rare honour reserved for elite athletes. His skill and determination shone through as he secured two major victories—one in Melbourne and another in Adelaide, both invite-only fights. His professional record currently stands at an impressive 5 wins and 2 losses.

Throughout his career, Connor has amassed 23 wins and only 1 loss, and in 2022, he was ranked in the top 5 nationally. Since 2018, he has won 117 matches, claimed four state titles, and twice became a National Champion. Connor's achievements extend to over 60 gold medals, with his sights set on the ultimate goal: becoming a world champion. His relentless pursuit of excellence, both in competition and training, continues to push him toward the top of the sport.

LITERACY SUPPORT

Students have been provided with intensive support from Teachers and SSOs within all Year 7 and 8 English and Additional Literacy classes. During English and additional literacy lessons, Teachers will provide learning direction to students, then both Teachers and SSOs will support reletation of new learning with small student groups. This will take place within the classroom, as opposed to students being withdrawn and interrupting other subjects twice a week.

Teachers will plan and provide SSOs with direction on planned learning for each iteracy block. Learning will be differentiated to support individual student progress, whether they need support with decoding, fluency, or comprehension. The Teachers will provide instruction to studented using lesson, then afterwards, both Teacher and SSOs will provide tracegred support to particular groups. In addition, all Year 7 students will complete the Spelling Through Morphographs program during English. This program teaches prefixes, sufficies and words bases and gives secondary students the tools to transfer their spelling knowledge to vocabulary, strengthening comprehension as a result.

phonics

In Term 4, our Phonics withdrawal intervention for Year 7 and 8 students commenced on Monday 14th October (Week 1). Phonics is a structured lesson and partaking students are expected to attend 3 x 20 minute weekly sessions, taking place in the Library and with a trained SSO facilitator. Students will come out of a subject class (not the same subject more than once per week), to partake in short sessions, then return to their subject class a normal. Students will also be provided allowances to attend Phonics, to ensure that they do not miss out on content or fall behind, due to attending. SSO Mark Karvis has continued to support students through their learning and across Senseter 2. Through the end of Term 3 and across Term 4, students have and will continue to partake in further screening checks. These screening checks will identify progress or further students requiring support. The screening checks utilised will be complete with the use of the Beginning and Advanced Decoding Surveys.

Over 2022 and 2023, approximately 50 students across Year 7 and 8 were supported and significant improvements were made by partaking students. In 2024, we are supporting 20 - 25 students across Year 7 and 8

What is Phonics and how does it help our students? While phonics is just one part of learning to read, alongside phonemic awareness, vocabulary, fluency, and comprehension, studies have shown phonics to be the most effective way of teaching children to read vords accurately and fluently. READING LEVEL ASSESSMENTS

Salisbury High School has now transitioned away from using the Running Record reading level assessments, to now using Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills (DIBELS) and New Group Reading Test (NGRT) assessments.

Current and incoming cohorts of students have and will be assessed, providing additional information on best support practices for our students.

Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills (DIBELS)

DBELS is a series of short tests (1 – 3 minutes) that assess Year 7 and 8 students, identifying student or and and perform tests in a set of procedures and measures for assessing the acquisition of a set of Year 7. Bitracy skills such a sphonenic awareness Japhabet principle, accuracy, hency, and comprehension. This information provides insight on students student reading levels and how best to support our students further.

New Group Reading Test (NGRT)

The New Group Reading Test (NGRT) is a standardised assessment to measure reading skills of students aged 5-16 years against the national average. Through a variety of exercises, NGRT can assess students' knowledge of phonics, comprehension. decoding ability, vocabulary, grammatical knowledge, deduction and inference skills, authorial intent, and ability to deal with figurative and idiomatic language (depending on the age of the student and test selected). Tasks include sentence completion, passage comprehension and phonic exercises. NGRT tests not just the ability of students to decode what they read, but also to comprehend and apply meaning.

Enables one-on-one assessment of phonics skills for struggling readers from the middle of first grade through adulthood. Designed to pinpoint decoding strengths and weaknesses in students. The surveys can be used to identify which skills have already been mastered and which are weak. Diagnostic Decoding Surveys (Advanced Plus, Advanced and Beginning)



Kilpatrick Phonological Awareness Screening Test (PAST)

SOCIAL SKILLS

Wellbeing Update

Mental Health:

Mental health encompasses an individual's emotional, psychological, and social well-being. It plays a crucial role in shaping how we think, feel, and make decisions, and it influences our ability to manage stress, relate to others, and navigate life's challenges. In the past year, the world has witnessed a surge in mental health issues among young people in Australia, exacerbated by the global pandemic and the threat of COVID-19.

Research indicates that from 2018, roughly two in five young people between the ages of twelve and twenty-five experienced a decline in their overall well-being and mental health. However, surveys conducted in 2020 during the pandemic revealed a startling increase, with approximately one in two young people now affected. This shift demonstrates the profound impact of COVID-19, not only on the lives of young individuals but also on their families and friends.

Families have grappled with severe lockdown measures, leading to job losses, school closures, and the shuttering of numerous businesses and recreational activities. This period has witnessed financial hardship due to job and income losses, as well as a decline in social and physical interactions. The ongoing uncertainty related to political stability and the impacts of climate change has further added to the stress and anxiety about the future.

Adolescents and young people, in particular, are navigating a critical phase of their lives, striving to establish their identities, career paths, travel experiences, and eventually, their own families. Unfortunately, the past year has seen many young people struggling to balance school, home, work, and maintain social skills and connections. These challenges have taken a toll on their mental health and well-being.

With the increasing reliance on social media to stay connected, teenagers are, on average, spending anywhere from six to nine hours daily on these platforms. The prevalence of technology and access to social media heighten the risk of cyberbullying, social anxiety, and depression among teens.

For parents or students seeking assistance, the Wellbeing team at Salisbury High School is available to provide support. Additionally, there are external services that can offer further support:
